Two hundred and seventy-five additional guards and lookout watchmen will be hired to fight fires in the national forests as the result of a projected increase in the forestry service fund. Necessity for the increase, costing \$275,000, was pointed out in congressional committee hearings by Congressman William H. Greeley, chief forester. Last year he said there were but 2,710 guards for a total area of 158,000,000 acres, of which 31,780,000 acres carry a high fire hazard. Each man was responsible for an average of 34,000 acres. During the season there were 5,554 fires of all sizes.

POP GATES LOST HIS VOICE, BUT LIKED HIS TRIP

After having traversed over 16,000 miles since leaving for the national convention of the Shrine at Miami, Fla., a month ago, and visiting various large and small cities in the far west, middle west, south and southwest, E. Gates arrived home last Saturday noon, sold more than ever before on Medford and the Rogue River valley as a beautiful residence place.

This is not a boast talk on the part of Pop—he says he honestly felt in Saturday and still feels it today. He saw many other pretty places—he hardly knows how to express it, but it was not like the good old grand greenery of Oregon. Something different in the atmosphere of those other places, but what's the use? He can't tell just why Medford and the valley is so beautifully different to him.

"I felt it when coming down the Shikayo Saturday and when I stepped from the Shasta train at Ashland into George's waiting automobile in which we rushed thru the valley to home," said Mr. Gates.
