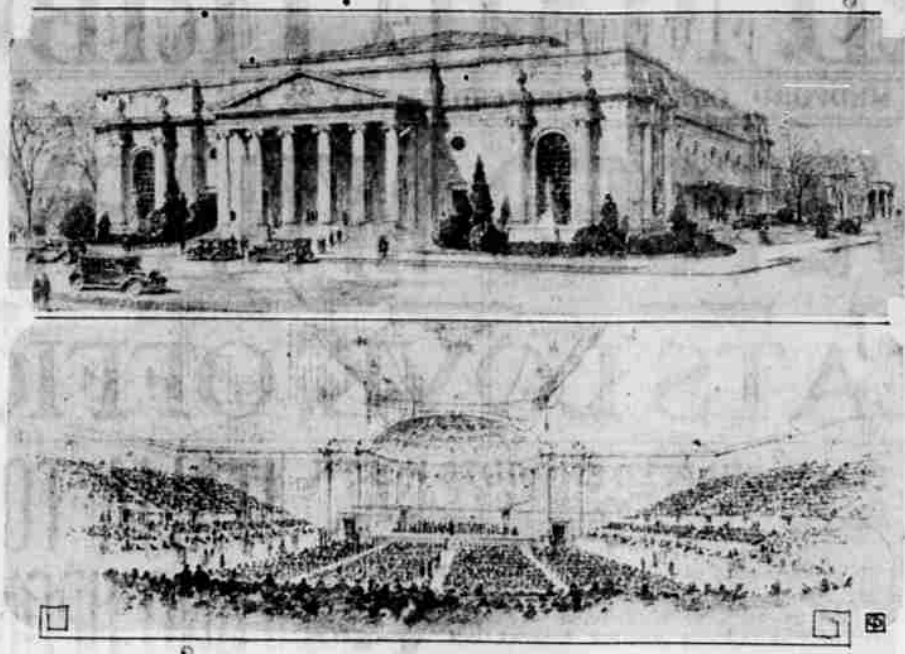

Citizens Urged to Get Ready for Clean Up Week on Monday

Medford residents are urged by Fire Chief Elliott to make early preparations for Clean-up and Paint-up week, which opens next Monday, continuing until the following Saturday, when specially organized patrols of Boy Scouts will check up on the general condition of front yards, back yards, streets and alleys. Refuse, tin cans and trash will be hauled away by the city sanitary service, with the charge borne by each owner of such trash.

Fire Chief Elliott, in suggesting preparations for clean-up week, advised local property owners to hoe grass away from the sides of buildings as fire protection and if trash is to be burned he announced that a permit must be now obtained from him before a fire can be started, as with the arrival of warm weather, the fire hazard has increased considerably.

MOSCOW, May 22.—(AP)—The death toll of two Russian ship disasters today stood at 52. A steam launch on the river Kuban, carrying 38 children, capsized at Temuzak. Thirty-four children were drowned.

Nineteen persons died in a fire on the steamer Leo Tolstoy which was tied to a dock in the Dnieper river near Petrovsk.

The crew of the Leo Tolstoy, with the exception of the captain and two sailors, were arrested today, charged with leaping into the water from the ship as soon as they caught sight of the fire, instead of making an attempt to save the passengers.

A special investigating commission also has ordered the arrest of a consignment of ether shipped aboard the steamer, alleging that it was packed so negligently as to permit an explosion, causing the disaster.

McKenzie Highway Opens. PORTLAND, Ore., May 22.—(AP)—The McKenzie pass highway, artery across the Cascade mountains between Eugene and Bend, will be open to traffic tomorrow, the Oregon State Motor association announced today. The highway was closed on account of snow last December. Plows have been at work on the drifted snow in the higher altitudes since March 1.
