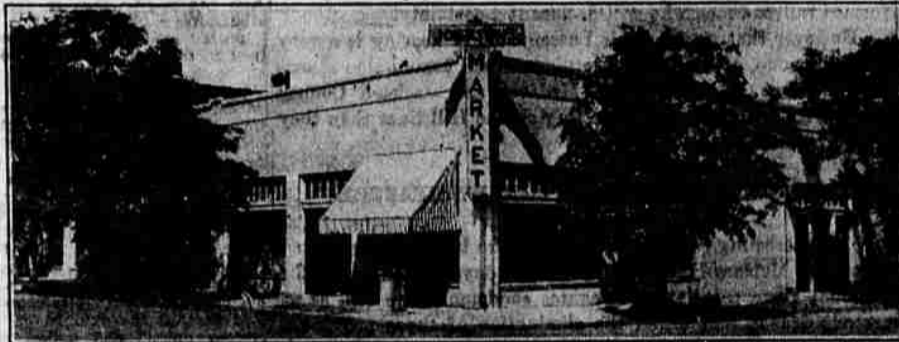

Fried Oysters Supreme (Los Angeles sends this recipe) Oysters fried in Crisco retain all their own delicate sea-tang. For Crisco is a sweet, delicate-tasting fat. 1/2 cup flour, 1/2 cup ketchup, 2 dozen oysters, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt, Cracker dust, or fine dried bread crumbs. Mix flour and ketchup together, stir in milk slowly. Add salt. Drop each oyster into this batter, then roll in cracker dust or bread crumbs.
