START BUILDING PROGRAM AT ONCE FOR COUNTY FAIR

There was an enthusiastic meeting of the directors of the Jackson County Fair association, in the courthouse last evening, and the members were highly pleased over the splendid endorsement of the one-mill levy by the people of the county and passed the following resolution:

"The Jackson County Fair association directors in regular session wish to thank the voters of this county for the decisive approval they have the expansion program for the county fair, by authorizing the one-mill tax levy for this purpose at the recent election.

"We feel sure that the final results will justify your confidence and will show a valuable service rendered to the agricultural and all other productive interests of Jackson county.

"Let everyone boost the fair, to be held September 12 to 15, inclusive."

HAIL STORMS LEAVE RUIN IN ALABAMA

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., May 25.—(AP)—Approximately 200 families have been left destitute as a result of terrific hail storms in west central Alabama.

Loss to crops and property was estimated today at more than \$20,000,000.

Approximately 600 square miles of farm land was practically laid waste by the storms of Tuesday, the extent of which was revealed only today. It was estimated that 16,000 acres of cotton and 4000 acres of corn were ruined.

Appeals have been made to the national Red Cross for aid.

Nicholas Butler to Support Lowden; Wants to Be V.-P.

NEW YORK, May 24.—(AP) The Evening Post today says that Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, President of Columbia university, in declaring today flatly in favor of Frank O. Lowden for the republican nomination for the presidency made an indirect announcement of his own willingness to run for vice president as the mate of the former governor of Illinois.

The newspaper says that the announcement makes it certain that the New York state delegation will split three ways on the first ballot at the Kansas City convention, with President Coolidge and Secretary Hoover getting the majority.

HOPE WANING FOR BADLEYS RECOVERY

A report received from the Sacred Heart hospital today stated that the condition of George Badley, who has been unconscious since last Friday, following an accident in the Hester Falls district, where he was struck in the back by a rolling log, is unimproved.

Although taking a great deal of liquid nourishment, the patient has not as yet rallied from his unconscious state. Hope for his recovery is beginning to wane, but has not been entirely abandoned.

1000 CHILDREN ARE LEFT FATHERLESS

MATHER, Pa., May 25.—(AP)—Mather mine has given up an additional five dead to bring the total of recovered bodies to 108. The bodies were found under a slate fall last night. They were badly mutilated.

One body was identified as that of David R. Jones, 61, who is said to have been a star pitcher for the old Louisville club when the Kentucky city was in the National league.

A daughter, Louise Jones, lives in Cleveland.

An unofficial Red Cross survey was reported to have shown that there are 1000 fatherless children in the town as a result of the mine disaster.

HARRY CORBETT TO BE GOVERNOR TWO WEEKS

SALEM, Ore., May 25.—(AP)—Beginning June 4 State Senator Harry L. Corbett of Portland will be acting governor of Oregon for about two weeks. This will be during the absence of Governor Patterson, who goes to Chicago to deliver a radio address. The state constitution provides that during the absence of the governor from the state, the president of the senate shall serve in his place and Senator Corbett was president of the 1927 state senate.
