

DIAMOND LAKE FISHING SEASON STARTS JUNE 1

While preparations are going forward for the opening of the Crater Lake season on June 25, because of the California Editorial association meeting at the lodge on that date for their three days convention, arrangements are under way also for the opening of the Diamond Lake resort early in June. The fishing season there begins June 1st.

Former Sheriff Charles Terrill left today for Klamath Falls, from where he and Mrs. Terrill, who has been visiting relatives there, will journey on to Diamond Lake to remain for the season at that resort, having in charge, as usual, the supply store and boats at the south end of the lake.

Concerning the early opening of the road to the lake, the Klamath Falls Evening Herald says: "If all goes well—by which he means if a late spring snow storm does not appear—the road to Diamond Lake will be open to automobile traffic by June 1. District Game Warden Marion J. Barnes announced today, following a trip on the Diamond Lake road as far as his car would proceed.

"We've got to open it up somehow or other to allow the transportation of trout eggs from the Diamond Lake trout hatchery, the game warden explained. It is trying to secure the services of a snowplow to clear away the remaining snow on the last five miles of the road which is now impassable."

"Fishing season at the lake opens June 1. To date approximately 10,000,000 eggs have been taken at the hatchery."

NEW EXECUTIVE FOR BOY SCOUTS HERE FOR DUTY

William Lee Bricker arrived this week from Seattle to take over the duties of Boy Scout executive for the Crater Lake council here and was scheduled to hold his first conference with the council this afternoon. Mr. Bricker recently completed attendance of a training course for professional scout leaders, held for the first time in many years on the Pacific coast in connection with the eighteenth annual meeting of the national council, Boy Scouts of America.

Although still in his twenties, Bricker has had wide experience in scouting and other lines of boys' work. Since January, 1928, he has been with the Seattle high schools and was formerly King county representative for the Moran School for Boys.

Mr. Bricker, who is taking the position left vacant by W. W. Decker, who was recently transferred to the Hood River area, is settling down to the routine work of his new duties and is already making plans for the summer camp for Scouts in the Applegate district.

ENDORSEMENT BY NORTON OF JUDGE THOMAS IS ISSUE

The race for the circuit judgeship, late started between the incumbent, Charles A. Thomas of this city, and Attorney H. D. Norton of Grants Pass, Democratic nominee, promises to find all other contents in the November election, unless Norton, as rumored, withdraws.

Norton entered the lists in the closing days of the primary campaign after he had been recommended by a Democratic committee meeting, and agreed to run after considerable urging. Previously he had signed the petition widely signed by the attorneys of Josephine and Jackson counties, urging Judge Thomas to seek re-nomination. Friends of Judge Thomas plan to confer their political support upon this established fact. Norton has never taken an active interest in politics, and is said to have been, and still be, lukewarm about making the race.

C. W. (Wig) Ashpole, nominated for commissioner on the Democratic ticket, is also diffident and has not made up his mind about qualifying. In a previous statement Mr. Ashpole said that with cattle on a thousand hills, and a full fledged butcher business, he had "no bunkering for a thank-you job."

MEDFORD TO PLAY WEED BASEBALL DECORATION DAY

Baseball fans will have an opportunity to see the two league leaders play ball on the afternoon of Decoration day at the Jackson county fair grounds. This ought to be a real contest, as the Weed team is as strong as the Medford Merchants' both in the pitching and batting departments. The Weed team is composed of a bunch of St. Mary's college players, who always give a good account of themselves in a baseball contest. Manager Hall has declared when a baseball team beats the Medford bunch the fans will see some games. SHAW SHOWS HE IS CLASS; WOOD TO TRY TONIGHT

Demonstrating that he is one of the best, if not the best, wrestlers who ever invaded southern Oregon, Billie Shaw of Marion, Ohio, challenger of Ed (Strangler) Lewis, last night decisively defeated Stanley Rogers, former local Lithuanian wrestler, in a match at Klamath Falls. If Shaw keeps up the same pace he had last night, he will probably throw Sadler Jack Wood of this city and Don Noland of Marshfield in short order at the American Legion drum corps benefit bouts tonight at Elbarity hall.

Shaw threw the Lithuanian for the first fall in 24 minutes and before the second fall Rogers attempted to come Shaw's eyes and pull his hair. Becoming annoyed at the Lithuanian's actions, Shaw picked him up and threw him bodily eight or ten feet into the crowd. Coming back to the ring bewildered and dazed, Rogers was picked up again and given an airplane spin, the effects of which completely laid him under.

Noland and Wood will find themselves up against a hard man in Shaw and waters are being made that the Ohio wrestler will throw both in less than 90 minutes. Tex Porter of Medford, who won a match in Klamath Falls last night, will wrestle tonight's semi-windup with Thurman Jackson of Chilquin, following several boxing and wrestling preliminaries.

The American Legion drum corps will parade Main street this evening and will play several selections at various street intersections before the opening of the smoker, which begins promptly at 8:30. The drum corps will be in uniform and will also play at the wrestling pavilion, the ventilation of which has been improved by the removal of the sides, allowing fresh air to enter in large volumes.

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
