The Tragic Romance of Mary Todd Lincoln

What was the true story of Abraham Lincoln and his wife? Was it a bitter tragedy or a beautiful romance? Was Mary Todd Lincoln the terrible creature who made her great husband's life a continuous martyrdom, as some biographers have declared? What did she, who knew him best, think of him? Were they unhappy together? And why did her mind give way at the end?

Historians and biographers have sought the answers to these questions for a half century in vain, while Mary Todd Lincoln's family have remained silent. They have allowed venomous war-time gossip and stray documents to be glorified into history, but Lincoln's son, Robert Todd Lincoln, felt that his beloved mother needed no vindication. It was only after his death about two years ago that his mother's sister and niece felt they could give the facts to the world.

What they now reveal are not historian's guesses based on official documents and glimpses of friends and acquaintances. It is the truth from those who saw with their own eyes—from those who lived with the Lincolns and loved them and suffered with them as their own flesh and blood. Lincoln's "Little Sister" she whom Lincoln always called "little sister," Emilie Todd Helm, has given her diary to her daughter, Kate Helm, known as "the little rebel in the White House."

With this intimate record, which includes the dread war period when Mary Lincoln's half-sister and niece lived with the Lincolns; with precious unpublished family letters and letters of Mary's closest friends, Kate Helm has written for McCall's Magazine a biography of "Mary, Wife of Lincoln" which not only will change the world's idea of her but which, historians and Lincoln authorities say, will set the history of the great president in a new light.

And when Lincoln's name began to be mentioned for the presidency, "Mr. Lincoln persisted in his modest estimate of himself. I must in all candor say I do not think myself fit for the presidency," Mary laughed at him for thinking himself "not fit."

When the Civil War came, its terrible throngs echoed and resounded in her day after day; but in her spirit there was no succession from the spirit of her husband or from the principles for which he fought. Her brothers were in the confederate army and two of them were killed and one gravely injured.

Her Hidden Sorrow "Mary Lincoln did not refuse to take an oath of allegiance to the United States which would have passed her through the northern army lines. It was then that Lincoln sent that message: 'Send her to me.'"

Speech From a Stricken Heart "Then one day, Mary talked from the depths of her heart and Emilie set down her words. Here are only a few words from the many pages of Emilie's diary which reveal the tragedy in Mary's heart."

Love Ripened Quickly "Lincoln called on her and they became friends very quickly. What could they have in common, these two who were so different in rearing and temperament and manner?"

Visiting the Old Home "In 1847, the mother of two sons and the wife of Congressman Lincoln, Mary visited her old home. On this event, Miss Helm quotes from her mother's diary: 'It was a cold day in November and the side hall was chilly as the door was thrown open to receive them. The white family stood near the front door with welcoming arms, and in true patriarchal style, our colored contingent filled the rear of the hall to shake hands with the long-absent one and make a miration' over the babies."

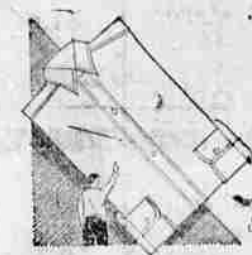
