ASHLAND, May 26.—(Special)

—As queen of the May, Miss Julia Eakin, Normal school student, was the central figure in a pageant which was a mass of vivid color, a medley of dances and songs, a real bit of old English custom, which was presented by the southern Oregon Normal school on Friday afternoon in Lathia Park before an audience that lined the hillside amphitheater near the bandstand. The whole program was marked by a beautiful consistency to ancient customs with jarring note of the modern.
