Recipe for Killing Dandelions. At a meeting of the Live Oak Grange of Rogue River, the worthy lecturer, Mrs. Margaret Galticher, gave a valuable recipe for getting rid of dandelions. Hoping it may be a help it is published in this issue of the Tribune as follows: "Prick the crown of the dandelion with a sharp stick dipped in a solution made of 1/4 oz. of white arsenic to 1/2 gal. soft water. Boil 10 minutes in iron or granite kettle, then add 1 gal. soft water and one-third oz. caustic soda. Boil 15 minutes; poison, keep covered and in safe place." Mount Hood top rad being oiled. NEITHER ELEMENTS NOR ATHLETES OF EAST STOP CARDS

HARVARD STADIUM, CAMBRIDGE, Mass., May 26.—(AP)—Mud, rain and the combined track and field strength of more than a score of eastern colleges today could not stop the brawny sons of Leland Stanford university from carrying off the intercollegiate A. A. A. team championship for the second straight year.

Eleven Stanford athletes, led by the stalwart sophomore, Eric Krenz, piled up a total of 43 points to spruce-up the field and win by the biggest margin any victorious team has had in thirteen years. Yale, carrying the forlorn hopes of the east, finished second with 25 1-2 points while Cornell and Pennsylvania tied for third with 12 points apiece.

Capturing four first places and scoring altogether in eight of the fifteen events, Stanford had a runaway of it from start to finish. It wasn't close at any stage of the rain-swept finals.

Stanford's winning total was the highest since 1917.

Krenz was able to rest up his laurels of yesterday, clinching first place in the shot put and discus with his record-breaking preliminary throw, but no one was able to threaten today, but Barbuti of Syracuse was forced to go out and earn his twin victories in the 220-yard dash and 440-yard run.

The big Syracuse flier beat out the Stanford captain, Emerson (Bud) Spencer, the favorite, by a yard in a thrilling finish in 48 8-10 seconds. Apparently none the worse for the wear and tear of this grueling event, Barbuti came back an hour and a half later to win the 220 with a sensational finish that overcame Barron Rockwell of Princeton in 22 5-10 seconds.

The three I. C. A. A. A. championship meet records set yesterday all withstood fresh attacks today and remained as the sole record product of the carnival.

Sabin W. Carr of Dubuque, Iowa, and Yale, was content with beating his foremost rival, Lee Barnes of Southern California in the pole vault. After winning the event with a vault of 12 feet 6 inches, Carr set sail for a new world's record height with the bar at 14 feet 2 inches.

MRS. REED WINNER IN WOMEN'S PLAY STATE GOLF TITLE

PORTLAND, Ore., May 26.—(AP)—Mrs. Kenneth Reed, Wavorly country club's modest unassuming golf star, now holds the unique distinction of being women's golf champion of two states.

When she entered the Oregon state title competition which ended today on the tricky course of the Columbia country club, she was Washington state champion, an honor she won last year by defeating the best golfers of that state, California and British Columbia.

Today she defeated Miss Margaret Murphy of the Columbia country club in the finals of the 1928 Oregon state championship, six and five, and thereby retained the title she won the year before last and lost last year.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 26.—(AP)—Don Moe, golf star of the Alderwood and Eugene country clubs is Oregon's new golf champion. In the finals of the fifth annual state tournament on the Columbia country club course today, Moe swept through his 26 hole final test with a nine up and eight to go victory over Vincent Dolp, young Alderwood club mate and high school champion of the new title holder.

It was the most decisive victory marked up in Oregon state tournament play in years.

Moe took a firm grip on the title in the morning round of eighteen holes which he finished eight up on young Dolp. Dolp was erratic on the morning round and found plenty of trouble. Moe, steady as a clock, walked thru every open gate unlocked by his opponent with the result that he won nine of the eighteen holes played before lunch.

The new champion had an even 72 for the morning round, going in 35 and coming home in 37. Dolp, who conceded his opponent two holes on the first nine was given an approximate 81.

It looked for a time on the second eighteen in the afternoon as if Dolp would be equal to a rally but his opponent's lead of eight up was too much to overcome.

The largest gallery that ever followed an Oregon state championship match saw young Moe crowned king of the state's linkmen. More than 2,000 spectators were gathered around the tenth green in the afternoon to see Dolp congratulate Moe at the finish of the match.

In the finals of the first flight of the men's championship Edward Richards, Tacoma, defeated Francis Andrews, Alderwood, two to one. L. J. Nichols, Portland, defeated E. O. Inman, Eugene, four and three, in the championship.

DE PALO INJURED IN SPEED TRIALS AT INDIANAPOLIS

INDIANAPOLIS, May 26.—(AP)—Peter DePaolo of Los Angeles, 1924 speedway driving champion, was injured at the Indianapolis motor speedway late today when his car turned over while he was attempting to qualify for the annual five hundred mile race to be held here Wednesday.

DePaolo was rushed to a hospital. He was conscious and appeared to be only slightly injured, it was said.

The accident occurred as DePaolo, driving the first lap on a four lap qualifying trial, came out at the back stretch. He lost control of his machine which was travelling more than 100 miles an hour and it crashed into the outside wall, rebounded and turned over three times.

DePaolo was thrown clear of the car and had regained his feet by the time help reached him. His fact was cut and his left arm dangled uselessly.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 26.—(AP)—Leon Duray broke the track record at the motor speedway here this afternoon when he drove his racing car around the two and one-half mile brick oval four times in four minutes, 54.14 seconds, for an average speed of 122.391 miles an hour, in a qualifying trial for the 500 mile race to be held here next Wednesday. Duray's time was five seconds better than the old mark.
