

MEMORIAL RITES HELD CHRISTIAN CHURCH SUNDAY

Mr. Mell called attention to the great sacrifice of human life in the World War, which he said was the result of greed and selfishness and forgetting God.

Number of enlistments, omitting re-enlistments, during the Civil war, is recorded as 2,213,165. Killed in action or died of injuries, 389,275; died of disease, exposure and other causes, 252,453; total casualties 641,728.

Average age of enlistment, about 22 years. The number of survivors of the Civil war whose names are now on pension rolls is 77,610. The average age of this now living is estimated as about 85 years.

TEXAS CANDIDATE CALLS ON FARMERS TO VISIT HOUSTON

HOUSTON, Texas, May 28.—(AP) His hat in the democratic presidential ring but a few days, Jesse H. Jones of Houston has already made a bid for the support of the farmers.

On record as willing to become a candidate for president, provided he "can better serve the party in that capacity," the millionaire lumberman and treasurer of the democratic national committee, yesterday invited the farmers to come here for redress instead of "marching on Kansas City."

His statement issued after he was shown comment on the failure of the McNary-Haugen bill from the middle west, said: "The farmers will not be actually welcome at Kansas City because excuses must be made there but we welcome them most cordially to Houston where a party platform will be written that will insure equal opportunities to all American citizens to sell and buy in fair markets without discrimination or class favors."

"The American farm is one of the chief foundations of American welfare and prosperity. The farmers are among our most solid and respected citizens. They should never be put in a position of people asking favors. They should share in the councils which make steadfast public policies and equality for all."

"The American farmer refuses to be put in the position of dependency. He is demonstrating that fact by his threatened march on Kansas City 100,000 strong. We say to him: 'come to Houston where you will be welcome—where your real friends will be assembled June 26.'"

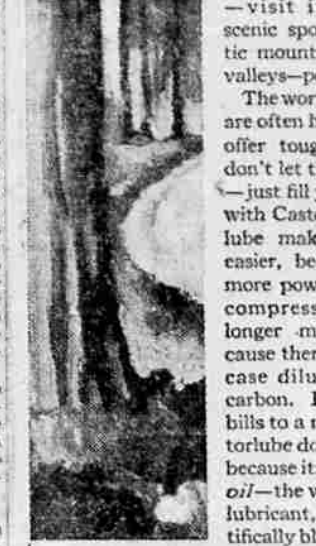
