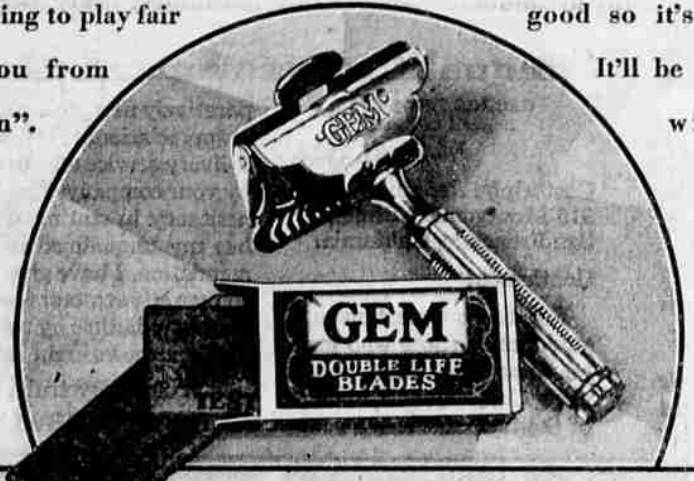

CUBS AND CINCY STRENGTHEN HOLD IN PENNANT RACE

 Fine pitching performances by Carl Mays and Sheriff Blake have enabled Cincinnati and Chicago to strengthen their hold on first and second place in the National league pennant race.
 Mays, who pitched his submarine slants in the American league for years, hurled the Reds to a 2-0 victory over the Cards at St. Louis yesterday. It was a costly victory for the league-leaders, however, for Red Lucas, ace of the pitching staff, suffered a broken bone in his wrist during batting practice.
 Forty thousand persons jammed Wrigley field to see Blake blank the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3 to 0, granting five scattered safeties. It was Blake's fifth straight victory of the season. Two of the Cubs' runs were driven in by Cliff Heathcock.
 The New York Giants moved into third place by noosing out the Phils in both ends of a double bill, 5-4 and 2-1.
 The Robins and Boston Braves divided a double-header at Brooklyn. The Braves won the first game, 4 to 1. Ed Brandt pitched effective ball for Hornsby's club. Home runs by Del Bissnette and Harvey Hendrick aided Elliott in turning back the invaders in the nightcap, 3 to 2. Bissnette's drive was his eighth homer of the season.
 The best pitching of the day, however, came in the American league, Hadley gave Philadelphia only two hits as the Washington Senators downed the Athletics, 4 to 1. Bishop got both of the Mackmen's hits.
 The St. Louis Browns gained an even break in their series with the Indians by taking the last game, a free-hitting affair, 10 to 8.
 Ted Lyons beat Elam VanGilder in a pitchers' battle at Chicago and the White Sox noosed out Detroit, 3 to 2.
 Babe Ruth hit a home run, two singles, walked once and struck out once as the New York Yankees beat York of the New York Pennsylvania league in an exhibition game, 9 to 1.

Weekly Foreign News Review

(By Oscar Watson, Cable Editor, the Associated Press.)
 Numerous active influences were directed against the Italian government during the course of last week. There were outbreaks and demonstrations both in Jugoslavia and Austrian Tyrol. In both countries the Italian consulates were attacked and the Italian flag torn down.
 Austria apologized to the Italian charge d'affaires at Vienna; the Italian flag was re-hoisted and saluted by Austrian soldiers, but the demonstrations continued. The Austrian government was concerned lest the powerful voice of Mussolini might be raised again in denunciation of such acts, as it was when Austria aroused his anger by a world-wide protest against the Italian administration in the Tyrol leading to the alleged mistreatment of Austrians and Germans resident there.
 At Sebenico and Ladaich in Jugoslavia, the demonstrations were considered more serious for Jugoslavs had been aroused by the influence which Italy has exercised in Albania and also by a convention negotiated at Nettuno, but not yet ratified, whereby Italians may acquire land within 20 miles of Jugoslavia's Adriatic seacoast.
 At Buenos Aires, Argentina, the Italian consulate was bombed, eight persons in the building were killed and many wounded. Bombs were found in another part of the city but prevented from exploding. This was declared to have been the work of anarchists.
 Japan has joined with Germany and Great Britain in giving its approval of the anti-war pact devised by the American secretary of state, Frank B. Kellogg. Japan declared her readiness to enter into discussions for the cessation of wars and the establishment of universal peace.

BIG TEN HOPES IN OLYMPIC BUOYED

CHICAGO, May 28.—(AP)—Hopes of the big ten to play its outstanding stars on America's Olympic track and field team were buoyed instead of dimmed by the annual outdoor conference meet Saturday which marked another triumph for Illinois.
 Comparison of records made by the big ten tracksters and those competing in the eastern intercollegiate at Harvard on the same day and under about the same weather conditions, showed the west excelled in eight events, the east in six, while one, the running high jump, was even. The big ten was faster in all track events while the eastern performers were superior in the field, except for the high jump.
 Not only did Illinois win the title again with 85½ points, but it led the conference in athletes for the forthcoming Olympic tryouts with 11.
