

ARRANGEMENTS COMPLETED FOR MEMORIAL DAY

Annual Observance Promises to Excel All Previous Efforts—Legion to Take Active Part—G. A. R. Veterans Attend Last Night's Session.

Final plans for the annual observance of Memorial Day were made at last night's meeting of the G. A. R. Post No. 15 and Post Commander Bronley requested every Legionnaire and World War veteran to march in the annual parade tomorrow morning. A report by Col. Payne, chairman of the Memorial Day committee, showed that this year's parade and exercises would probably excel all previous efforts. Service Officers Chaney reported that preparations had been made to place wreaths on all World War veterans' graves throughout the county, the wreaths having been made by the Ladies' Auxiliary. He also read a list of 56 departed veterans of this county who are buried either here or abroad. It was moved to publish this list in the local papers and also to inscribe the names on a permanent memorial tablet to be placed in the legion quarters. Commander Bronley appointing a committee to take care of these details.

Honor guests of the evening were Messrs. Lyman, Hayes and Gill of the G. A. R., each of whom was called upon for a short talk. Mr. Lyman gave some interesting figures on the G. A. R., showing that of 2,213,165 enlistments during the Civil War, there remain today, after 63 years, only 77,610 veterans living. The average age of these G. A. R. members is 85. Beely Hall asked for the support of Medford post in securing a new support for Medford and received assurance of 100 percent cooperation. Ted Baker reported on the Roseburg trip stating that the Medford Post drum corps scored a big hit at the Roseburg Strawberry Carnival and secured some fine publicity for Medford and the Legion convention. Chairman McDonald reported on the coming convention and outlined the program which promises to break all records for the state.

A report of the recent smoker was read and showed the affair was a complete success. Jack Wood announced the big wrestling match for June 27th, featuring Champion "Strangler" Lewis and asked the cooperation of the post in making it a record breaker. CHILD STOLEN FROM BED AND FOULY SLAIN

Horror Crime at Toledo, Ohio—Brute Leaves Tiny Victim On Grandparents' Porch—Abductor Flees in Auto—Described As Small Man.

TOLEDO, Ohio, May 29.—Police this afternoon were questioning a suspect held for investigation in the death of Dorothy Sielagowski, 7, kidnaped from her bed, attacked and slain early today. The questioning followed a study of finger prints found on the automobile in which the girl is believed to have been killed.

TOLEDO, Ohio, May 29.—(AP)—A man early today entered the home of Alex Sielagowski here, and took Dorothy, aged seven, from the bed where she was sleeping with her three sisters, carried her to his automobile, attacked and killed her and then 20 minutes later threw the body on the porch of her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Felix Dobrenicki, a few doors from the child's home.

Police immediately started a search for a "small man in a black shirt" whom Sielagowski said he saw drive away from in front of the home a few minutes after the disappearance of Dorothy. Sielagowski said he also saw a small covered auto truck stop in front of the home.

The child's father and two brothers were asleep in a front bedroom.

Police said the slayers apparently were acquainted with the Sielagowski home, as they entered it through a back door, which was unlocked with a key.

Creeching on the stairway the man seized the child, clad only in her night dress. A sister, Stella, was awakened by the man and cried, "They are taking Dorothy away." They awakened the father, who looking out of his bedroom window, saw the automobile drive away.

The father said that about 20 minutes after the child was abducted, he saw two automobiles drive up in front of the Dobrenicki home. He thought nothing of it and immediately left for tobacco headquarters. Returning with officers he noticed a huddled figure on the Dobrenicki porch and investigating found the body of his child.

The coroner rendered a verdict of strangulation. The coroner said the child had been attacked.

A FISH STORY DEVELOPES IN POACHER TRIAL

PORTLAND, Ore., May 29.—(AP)—It was a plockie, not a pickered that Robert F. Tubbs was fishing for out in Johnson creek when he was arrested last year by Charles L. Bellarts, special deputy game warden, the game commission learned at its fish poaching hearing today. The commission thought Bellarts said "pickered" yesterday.

"Some kids were fishing for a cucumber," Tubbs told the commission. "I took the pole to try my luck. Mr. Bellarts arrested me," the commission thought that explained why Tubbs had not been prosecuted.

Elmer Albee of Heppner, former deputy game warden, testified today that Ed H. Clark, a deputy, when placed in charge of the salmon patrol in 1927, issued orders that the Williams be untroubled above the reef just below the Abernathy on odd dates and below the reef on nights of even dates. On odd nights operations of fish poachers below the reef could plainly be heard, the witness said, but the poachers were not untroubled.
