MEYER, VICTOR OF AUTO RACE, GIVES CREDIT TO BACKER

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 31.—Jumping from obscurity to fame overnight, Louis Meyer, boyish-looking Los Angeles youth, today found himself acclaimed the newest hero of the automobile racing world.

This 23-year-old driver thrilled a crowd of more than 140,000 spectators, breaking all previous attendance records by coming from behind in the last 30 miles of the race to win the 500-mile classic at the Indianapolis motor speedway yesterday. He piloted his car to victory in the most dramatic finish ever enacted in the classic. He rode the entire distance without relief and made only one stop. His time was 5:01:33.75, an average of 59.482 miles an hour.

Meyer today gave credit for his driving skill to Frank Elliott, a famous racing star of other years.

"Elliott taught me all I know about driving," Meyer said. "You know, I worked for him for two years as a mechanic. Oh, I'm happy. I thought I would win after 160 laps. I had worked pretty well into the race then, although I had only faint hopes of overtaking Jimmy Gleason and Tony Gullota. I just sat tight and let the old wagon buzz along and hoped for the best."

Meyer's victory was achieved after only 60 laps of previous experience on the Indianapolis course. He relieved Wilbur Shaw in the race last year for that length of time. His previous racing experience was gained on Ascot speedway in California. His present home is in Los Angeles.

Meyer found himself \$35,000 richer today as a result of his victory. He was extremely happy to get his fists on that roll of money, for it was only just a week ago that he had managed to scrape up enough money to enable him to buy the car in which he rode to triumph.

Only four of the 29 drivers shared in the lap prizes which were offered to the driver leading the field in each of the first 144 laps. Jimmy Gleason, the revised records showed today, captured the lion's share of the prizes, winning \$6700 for having led in 67 laps. Leon Duray led the race for the first 53 laps and later by five additional laps and took \$5800. The sum of \$1900 went to Babe Stapp and \$500 to Tony Gullota.

George Souders, the one-time Purdue university student, winner of the race a year ago, gave Meyer a dangerous challenge and was a close up third. Louis Moore's car finished second. Moore's tiny racer with Louis Schneider at the wheel as a relief driver was two and one-half miles behind Meyer at the finish, with Souders about five miles behind.

Ray Keech of Philadelphia, holder of the world's straightaway record for a mile, was fourth, with Norman Hatten fifth of the original cars floundering.

LOUGHRAN-LATZO BOUT POSTPONED

NEW YORK, May 31.—(AP)—New York weather has no favorites among boxing promoters. Tex Rickard was forced into numerous postponements in his first attempt of the season to stage a championship fight outdoors, by rain, and now his metropolitan rival, Humbert J. Fugazy, has suffered the same fate. As a result of a downpour the light-heavyweight championship bout between Tommy Loughran and Pete Latzo, originally scheduled for last night, will take place tomorrow, weather permitting.

DOUBLE HEADERS WON BY 6 TEAMS; NEW SERIES START

Twelve major league teams were on edge today for go-away skirmishes to clear the decks for the season's second stage of inter-sectional warfare scheduled to begin at some points along the baseball front as early as tomorrow.

The Cubs already were on their way east, while the Giants and the Robins lay idle.

Six teams won twice yesterday. The Reds nicked the Cubs twice only by showing the greatest competitive spirit. There was a 6-0 victory over Charlie Root in the morning behind the fine pitching of the veteran Eppa Jentha Rixey. In the afternoon Ford's single in the 19th provided the winning margin in a 2 to 1 victory, sent the Reds east with a lead of three full games.

The crippled Pirates sagged lower into the second division after the Cards scored victories, 19 to 1 and 4 to 3.

The Boston Braves walloped the Phillies 5 to 2 and 11 to 2. The Giants rolled the Robins over by 9 to 1 in the morning. The score was tied at 2 to 2 in the afternoon, when it rained.

Washington defeated the Yanks 5 to 0. Garland Braxton, a Yankee castoff held the Huggins to three hits, while the Senators made merry with young Al Shealy.

In the afternoon the Yank started to make amends by pounding Horace Izenberg for 7 runs in less than two innings, but rain ended the contest.

By defeating the Red Sox, 8 to 1 and 9 to 2, the Athletics gained one and one-half games on the Yankees, but remained seven games to the rear. Ty Cobb again was out of the lineup with nervous indigestion.

Detroit cleaned up two games on the faltering Indians, the afternoon engagement in 13 innings. The scores were 4 to 2 and 6 to 5.

The Browns won both ends of an afternoon double-header from the Chicago White Sox, 3 to 1 and 5 to 2. The veteran Red Faber pitched a good game in the opener, but lost.

GIANT NEGRO TO FIGHT IN EAST

LOS ANGELES, May 31.—(AP)—Joe Glaser of Chicago and the manager of several boxers, announced today that he had purchased the contract of Mack House, giant negro heavyweight of Los Angeles, and would take the fighter east for a series of matches. Glaser, who manages among other fighters, Eddie Shea, featherweight, Eddie Anderson, bantamweight, and Walcott Langford, middleweight, stated he had paid Watson Burns of Los Angeles \$5000 for the contract.

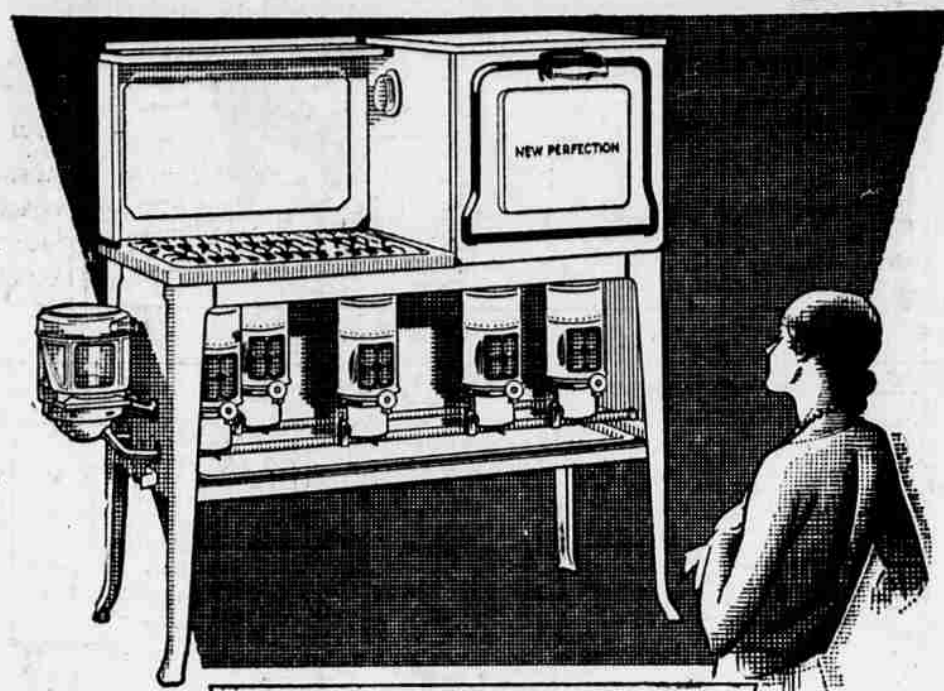
