F. P. FARRELL HEADS NEWLY CHOSEN G. O. P. CENTRAL COMMITTEE

The newly elected republican county central committee met today in the Hotel Medford and re-organized for the coming two years.

A. J. Crose, retiring chairman, presided and thanked the committee members for their splendid work in the past two years.

Frank Farrell was elected chairman; Vern Marshall, secretary and treasurer; Tom Simpson of Ashland, constitutional committeeman, and S. S. Smith, state committeeman. All except the chairman are re-elections.

The treasurer's report showed a small balance on hand.

A resolution was adopted calling attention to the powers placed in the committee by law, assuming full responsibility for the conduct of the coming campaign; pledging all the members of the committee and all candidates nominated at the recent primary to loyally support every candidate on the ticket; declaring against nepotism in public office favoring an increase in salaries for people elected to public office, and pledging the republican nominees if elected to co-operation and team work.

Another resolution authorizing the selection of an executive committee of eleven by the chairman, of which the chairman and secretary are ex-officio members, and a women's advisory committee of 21 was unanimously passed. The resolution also vests certain responsibility and power in the executive committee.

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NIGHT OF TERROR IN BELGRADE BY ANTI-ITALY MOB

BELGRADE, May 31.—(AP)—Belgrade passed through a night of terror and this morning there were many signs of destruction. Sanguinary encounters between police and students opposed to ratification of the Nettuno convention permitting Italy to get a grip on the Adriatic coast, lasted from eight o'clock in the evening until daylight today.

Stirred, revolutionary youths with rifles, clubs, bricks and all sorts of missiles were freely used. Two students were arrested but liberated when police feared their comrades would attempt to rescue them with violence.

Only the toleration and patience shown by the police and government authorities prevented the conflict from developing into open internecine warfare.

The Italian minister Signor Bordegnoni, again visited the foreign office today and cautioned the Jugoslav government that rioting and demonstrations against Italy must be suppressed at all costs. He warned that Italy will demand full reparation in behalf of all Italians whose lives or property have suffered.

Death Toll of the Automobile

PORTLAND, Ore., May 31.—(AP)—Struck by an automobile on the Hawthorne bridge last Saturday, Richard Schumann, 49, of Dorling, Ore., died today at a hospital. His death was the thirtieth city traffic fatality since December.

Schumann suffered a fractured skull when he walked into the side of an automobile operated by Ivan H. Waxson. Harnam was not held. Possibly fatal injuries were suffered early today by Frank Fairchild, address not known, when he was struck by an automobile on a street intersection.
