

MEDFORD WILL BE CENTER COLYEAR MOTOR CO., CHAIN

FROST SEASON FOR YEAR OVER, PEARS WELL DEVELOPED

That Medford has been selected as the southern Oregon headquarters for the Colyear Motor Sales company, auto parts chain corporation with branches all along the Pacific coast, was the statement made this morning by E. H. Mann, general manager for this district, who closed a deal this week with Elmer and Gene Childers for a five-year lease on two of their stores on East Main street. This space is being remodeled and equipped for the new concern.

The frost season for this year practically came to an official end yesterday, as the weather has been so well developed by this time that only an unusually severe frost would damage them. Floyd D. Young, head of the government frost service in the coast states, departed from Medford last night to look over the affairs of the sub-frost stations in the state of Washington, after which he will return to his home and headquarters at Pomona, Calif.

All of southern Oregon and part of northern California will be serviced from Medford, and branches of the Colyear company are being established in Grants, Pass, Ashland, Dunsmuir, Weed and other points along the line by Mr. Mann, who has been working in this district for the past eight months.

Mr. Young, prior to his departure, called attention to the fact that the weather has been very fortunate in passing through the past season in developing the unusually fine and normal crop of pears by having to combat but comparatively little dangerous frost, and that thanks to the general smudging at these few dangerous times, but very little damage was caused to the fruit and that mostly consisted in marking of fruit in several of the orchards. There was no commercial damage as a whole, he stated.

While Mr. Mann will spend most of his time in this city, he will make frequent trips through the district and make the necessary improvements arising in the new development of this territory. "After nearly a year spent in carefully going over the ground in southern Oregon and checking up on conditions in this territory, I reached the conclusion that Medford is the logical center not only for our line of work, but for other enterprises in southern Oregon, and I am more than enthusiastic over being located here," Mr. Mann said this morning.

There were only three severe frosts and consequent smudgings during the season, but on four other nights some of the orchards, located in the colder parts of the valley, smudged as a precautionary measure when the thermometer began to fall and their owners feared the temperature might go to a dangerous stage.

The Colyear Motor company, who are distributors for the Continental motors, Timken axle and rollers and other well known auto supplies, will open the local headquarters to both retail and wholesale trade within the next 30 days.

GOOD FISHING IN KLAMATH LAKE

Good news for Medford fishermen, meant the opening of the fishing season at Diamond lake tomorrow, is that both roads to that popular resort, via Union creek and the Klamath Falls road, are open to travel and free of snow all the way, are in good condition for this time of year and that there is no snow at the lake. Several Medford cars went to the lake yesterday.

Medford and valley fishermen who are fond of catching the big trout in the Upper Klamath lake or Pelican bay are getting ready to go to those waters as soon as they can. In earlier reports, it was the big fellows, as reports have been reaching here this week that the fishing is good there already and will steadily grow better. Many Klamath Falls fishermen fished in Upper Klamath lake last Sunday, the majority of whom were successful. Frank Riggs of that city caught a 12½-pound trout, a man named Nichols caught a 12-pounder and Albert E. May caught one weighing 11½ pounds.

The lodge is open at the resort, all the cabins and boats are ready and the supply stores are equipped and ready for the coming of the early season fishermen. This news was brought back today by George L. Howard, manager of the Diamond lake resort, who came down on a truck with the driver to take back a load of further supplies. They will leave on the return trip tomorrow morning.
