STOVE EXPLOSION DESTROYS SHED

Over 400 telephones were temporarily placed out of commission as a result of the fire, flames eating through a large cable near the shed, but service was restored today.

Fire, caused by a gasoline stove explosion, caused a small shed on the corner of Tenth and Ivy streets at 8:34 last evening, causing a loss of several hundred dollars. The shed was being used as a sleeping quarters by Fred Elaine, a local laborer, and was the property of Ralph Eates, who carried no insurance on the property. Though the shed was small, flames burned high, leading many to believe that a large structure was burning. The fire was quickly put under control following the arrival of the fire department.
