**VALLEY REALTORS FOR TRUCK LINES TO CRESCENT CITY**

Plans for extensive advertising of the Rogue river valley were formulated at the Realty board luncheon at the Hotel Medford today.

The development of truck freight lines in Oregon and California with Crescent City as the harbor, was described, and the advisability of co-operating with the future of that city stressed by members. It was pointed out that the truck rates are approximately 20 per cent lower than train service.

A motion was passed that the board go on record as favoring Medford's proposed new airport. Otto May acted as chairman in the absence of Walter Leverette.

**INCREASE SHOWN LOCAL BUILDING**

The building program in Medford for last month is nearly twice as large as the program carried on during May, 1927, according to figures completed at the city building department yesterday afternoon, revealing that building activities to the extent of \$70,465 were begun last month. The April total of \$7,150 is also much smaller than the May building program, which includes a business structure on South Central for Montgomery & Ward stores and a business structure on East Main street, where it is under construction by the Childers brothers for a dancing pavilion and a sporting arena.

**EMIL MOHR AND FAMILY READY FOR EUROPEAN TRIP**

Mr. and Mrs. Emil Mohr and children, Misses Anita and Edna, who are members of the graduating class at tonight's high school commencement at the Craterian theatre, and Emil Jr., gave up possession of their home on South Oakdale street, which they recently sold, preparatory to their year's absence abroad, to the new owners yesterday, and moved to the Hotel Medford, where they will stay until leaving the city tomorrow.

That is why local people, who are in the habit of scanning the register of that hotel daily, sat up at attention this morning on perusing the names of the Mohr family inscribed thereon, leading off with the name of Medford's well known landlady and manager of that hostelry ever since it was built, nearly years ago. Although Mr. Mohr himself and individual members of the family, and in fact the entire family, had in times past made more or less short stays at the hotel, it was the first time in local history that anyone had ever seen his name or that of any member of the family registered, the same as other guests of the hotel.

Incidentally, a feature of tonight's commencement will be the valedictory appearance of Mr. Mohr as a member of the school board, of which he has been president during the past year, as his term expires this month. It is understood that just prior to his handling over the diploma to the graduates tonight, President Mohr will make a very brief address on the accomplishments of the school board and Medford school system during the past year.

The Mohr family leaves by train tomorrow forenoon for San Francisco for a few days' visit with relatives there, and from that city will go to Detroit, Mich., to take possession of their new Cadillac car in which they will visit places of interest in the east between Detroit and New York City until on June 23 they sail on the steamship Herlin for their sojourn abroad, going direct to Hamburg, Germany, near which port the family will make their headquarters in the native place of Mr. and Mrs. Mohr while they make an extended visit with relatives and friends of their youth.

Of course the new Cadillac car will go with them on the same steamer, and from this headquarters in Germany from time to time they will visit various parts of Europe during their year's stay abroad.

**COURT OF HONOR OF BOY SCOUTS MAKE 4 AWARDS**

The Crater Lake Area Council held their regular court of honor meeting at the county court house last night. The recognition of progress along various lines was unusual. One of the merit badges which was awarded was the merit badge in art. A collection of drawings and selections was submitted by Scout Levon Dunford. Other interesting exhibits submitted to the jury were those on bird study, some interesting photographs being submitted. Albert Gaudis has a splendid collection of wild flowers which he submitted in connection with earning his merit badge in botany. There were also other charts in surveying, and badges were awarded for basketry, athletics, scholarship, music, handicraft, leather working and craft work.

The merit badge program in scouting is one of the fine phases of scouting, and scouts are given a contact with the field of knowledge which are indicated by the title of the badge.

Each scout, before coming up to the court of honor, has an appointment with an experienced counselor, who is a man of character in the community, and who may be questioned about the vocation in which the scout happens to be interested. This man examines the scout thoroughly.

The most impressive ceremony of the evening was the awarding of the eagle badge to Scout Master Larson of Troop 45, of Jacksonville, and three of the scouts of his troop—Scouts Marion Smith, Levon Dunford, Andrew H. Smith. The judge of the court, Don Newberry, gave a short talk of congratulations and explanation of the meaning of the high honor earned by the efforts of these scouts. Scout Commissioner Larry Schade, headed the jury of the court of honor—Colonel Paine, chairman; Raymond Corwell, E. R. Wilson of Jacksonville and Mr. Lewis, who sat on the jury.

The scouts who received these awards are Marion Smith, Robert Lewis, Bruce Merrifield and Orville Wilson. These badges were awarded by Colonel Paine, chairman of the court of honor.

**PENWELL AWARDED VERDICT BY JURY; DITCH SUIT ENDS**

A verdict awarding a judgment of \$146.75 in favor of Alvin Penwell, local plumber, was returned at 2:30 last evening by the jury in the trial of Penwell vs. Kate Stone, who was being sued for over \$200. The case of the Medford Logging Railroad vs. the Eagle Point Irrigation District was scheduled to begin this morning, but was settled out of court.
