NEW MANAGER OF GAS COMPANY GIVES BANQUET

T. A. Hopkins, vice-president of the Loveland Engineering corporation of San Francisco, who recently took over the management of the Southern Oregon Gas company, is in Medford several days, conferring with local officers in regard to future plans.

Mr. Hopkins, who has the supervision of the local company, will make periodical trips to this city in regard to company affairs.

In an interview this forenoon, Mr. Hopkins indicated that the present plant, located near Phoenix, is in good condition and that no improvements will be planned for the present. However, he is formulating a program in regard to sales campaigns in an effort to bring the general public into closer contact with gas as a household convenience and utility.

He pointed out that the field is large for this work, inasmuch as Roseburg, Grants Pass, Medford and Ashland are included in the operations of the company.

Last night company employees from the four cities were present at a dinner at the Hotel Medford, where plans for the future were thoroughly discussed.

K. I. Dasey, who has had much experience in the gas business, is the general manager of the company and has his headquarters here.

It was announced at the Crater National park offices here this forenoon that not only the Medford-Klamath Falls loop road at Anna Springs camp is now clear of snow, but that the road from Anna Springs camp to Government camp is open for more than half the distance.

Mr. and Mrs. Antle plan to return to their home in Medford during September and will visit friends and relatives in the eastern and middle western states while en route from New York, where they will arrive from Europe.

Upon meeting Judge and Mrs. Callahan, former well known local residents, in Chicago, the local couple will visit Niagara Falls with them while en route to Montreal. In Europe, the quartet will visit Scotland, England, France, Germany, Belgium, Holland and Switzerland, spending several weeks in each country.

The tour, it is said, had its inception when Mr. Antle was visiting the Judge in San Diego a short time ago when the former began looking over literature describing summer tours. In glancing over the literature and knowing that Judge Callahan had plans in the formation Mr. Antle was inspired to suggest: "Why can't we all go together?" and the suggestion was immediately accepted.

LOCAL WEATHER MAN TAKES AIR TRIP OVER STATE

L. Walter Dick, meteorologist of the Medford weather bureau, which position also puts him in charge of the apogeological work for the government, of the Medford air post, will be very much up in the air for the next four days—in fact, assumed that he is taking a four days' business vacation from his usual routine duties, which began this forenoon when he boarded the north bound air mail plane for Portland, from which city he will fly by plane to San Francisco, and then back to Medford. The purpose of this is to make a study, by first hand experience, of the air currents through which the planes usually fly, and to confer with the U. S. weather and apogeological officials at Portland and San Francisco.

His duties are being looked after here by H. J. Rogers, assistant meteorologist and assistant in front work of Floyd L. Young, diving the spring frost season.

ASHLAND BURGLAR GETS TWO YEARS

Clarence Reynolds, 25, a transient who gave his home address as Ohio, was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary when he entered a plea of guilty before Circuit Judge C. M. Thomas today on charges of burglary, following his arrest last evening in Ashland, where he broke into three family garages. He burglarized the garages of George E. C. Darling and S. C. Nimmer and out of the latter attempted to steal a Ford roadster, but was able to drive it only a short distance in Ashland when it ran out of gas. He was arrested shortly after he abandoned the machine.

FAMOUS ORGANIST TO GIVE CONCERT HERE

Frank L. Sealy, famous pipe organist of New York, will appear in concert at the Presbyterian church June 21 at 2 o'clock.
