The state handicap championship will be decided on the 200 handicap birds Friday and Saturday. Then there will be the state doubles on the first 25 pairs as well as the five-man team race for the state championship. There also is a trophy up for the high gun among the women shooters.

WASHINGTON WINS SUMMER CAMP OF COAST TRACK TILT; BOY SCOUTS TO BE OREGON IS THIRD ALONG APPLIGATE

MISSOULA, Mont., June 2.—(AP)—A growing Husky pack from the Puget Sound fought its way to the Pacific Coast conference track and field title here this afternoon on Donahue field in a sensational contest. University of Washington won the meet with a score of 42 1/2 points. Steve Anderson, superb Husky hurdler who destroyed the conference records in both hurdle races, was Washington's star.

First he cleared the 120-yard high hurdles in 14.4 seconds, equalling the world mark set by Thompson of Dartmouth. Then he broke the conference mark in the 220-yard low hurdles, which he ran in 23.6 seconds, bettering the mark James Payne of Southern California set Friday in the trials by three-thirtieths of a second.

Final scores of the meet were: University of Washington, 42 1/2; Oregon State, 33 1/2; Montana, 16; University of Oregon, 12 1/2; University of Idaho, 6.

University of California, with only two men entered, failed to score.

Officials of the meet announced that it was unlikely that the National Amateur Union would recognize the high hurdle mark set by Anderson, because he knocked down the fifth hurdle. Three watches caught Anderson in 14.4 seconds.

FRED KIDDLE TO BE CHAIRMAN OF G. O. P. DELEGATES

SALEM, Ore., June 2.—(AP)—Expressions received in Salem from members of the Oregon republican national convention delegation indicate that Fred E. Kiddle of Island City is likely to be the choice for chairman of the delegation. There has been some talk of Sam A. Kozar for the chairmanship for the reason that he received the highest vote, as a candidate for delegate, but Kozar said today that he believes Kiddle should be the selection for the reason that Kiddle was manager of the Hoover campaign in Oregon.

Local members of the delegation have received letters from W. F. Woodward and Russell Hawkins of Portland who would like to represent the Oregon delegation on the platform committee of the convention. No intimations have been received here as the probable choice of the democratic delegation for its chairman.

Most of the Oregon republican delegation will leave Portland Wednesday, going by way of Denver, and will arrive in Kansas City the following Sunday morning.

JIM CHINNOCK IN JOSEPHINE RACE

GRANTS PASS, June 2.—(Special)—With definite announcement by N.H.H. Allen that he will not be a candidate for nomination for state representative for Josephine county when the Republican central committee meets, sentiment was crystallizing today in favor of James T. Chinnock for that position. Mr. Chinnock's name was being freely mentioned for the nomination and it appeared that Republicans of the county might be able to agree upon him.

It is understood that Mr. Chinnock will accept the nomination if tendered by the central committee at its meeting. It was reported that he is receptive to the nomination.
