ASHLAND, June 4.—(Special)—Miss Lella Cady White, head of the Ashland Summer School of Art for several years past, has received recognition for her excellent work in the reproduction of one of her water color studies in a recent issue of "Everyday Art," a magazine devoted to the study of art. The picture was hung in an exhibition of the American Water Color society and the New York Water Color society. The Ashland Summer School of Art has been mentioned in many of the art publications throughout the country during the past year. Two hundred and ten diplomas were awarded. On June 12, the Southern Oregon Normal school will celebrate its commencement and will grant diplomas to its graduates.
