HELEN VIEWED AS SUZANNE'S EQUAL BY TENNIS SHARPS

PARIS, France, June 5.—(AP)—The victory of Helen Wills in the French international hard court tennis championships and the ease with which she dominated all competitors in capturing the title without the loss of a single set today revived the controversy as to the relative skill of the California girl and Suzanne Lenglen.

The admirers of Suzanne—and there are many—pointed out that Helen dropped on the average of three games a match while Suzanne was accustomed to disposing of her opponents in the early rounds without permitting them to score.

Close friends of Miss Wills said she had an aversion to winning love sets and did not desire to take advantage of an obviously weaker adversary, therefore she applied pressure only when necessary.

Neutral observers who have watched both players for many years asserted that never has Suzanne dominated a tournament with greater superiority than Helen did in the one just ended at Autell.

The opinion of ten experts at Autell was summed up thus: Helen lacks the killer instinct that made Suzanne so impressive against poorer players, but the American is now just as effective as Lenglen ever was against first-class opposition.

STRANGLER LEWIS THROWS INDIAN

PENDLETON, Ore., June 5.—(AP)—Ed (Strangler) Lewis, world's heavyweight wrestling champion, defeated John Figno Wilcox, Indian heavyweight from Oklahoma, in two straight falls here last night. The champion took the first fall in 18 minutes with a headlock and the second in one minute with a series of headlocks, an arm scissors and top body pin.

Wallace Duquid and Howard Cantonwine, heavies, went a half hour to a draw, with Cantonwine the aggressor. Francis Stull of Pendleton took two out of three falls from Cecil Alford of Pendleton in another preliminary.

BOSTON, June 5.—(AP)—Lloyd Hahn, America's best prospect in the Olympic 800 and 1500 meter races, has reported to his coach, Jack Ryder, in excellent physical condition.

Though Hahn has not raced since March and had spent 48 hours on the train which carried him here from his Nebraska home, he ran a quarter mile in 51 seconds. Then he jogged a mile and a half.

The Nebraska flier will work out daily under Ryder and his first race will probably be in the eastern Olympic tryouts at New York on June 16. Ryder believes that he needs only two or three races to get in perfect condition.

ROLLER TO SHOW IN PRELIMINARY OF TITLE MATCH

Koller arrived Saturday from Phoenix, Ariz., and had expected to wrestle in the main event. He is rated high in his class and expected to show real action against O'Brien. A second preliminary, according to present plans, may be wrestled between Sallor Jack Wood and William Sandahl for a one-fall finish match. Sandahl is a wrestler of many years experience and will give Wood a hard battle. The first preliminary will take place between two local boys, whose names have not been announced.

Strangler Lewis will arrive late Wednesday or early Thursday morning and his \$10,000 diamond studded championship belt will be placed on display all day Thursday at some jewelry store or possibly at the chamber of commerce.

Shaw, who is regarded as Lewis' most worthy opponent on his coast tour, is redoubting his efforts in working out and is determined to surprise Lewis if he can. Shaw's match with Lewis is the only one attempted in Oregon with the heavyweight crown at stake, according to Wood, who said today that both men will weigh in at the ring.

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TEST LEGALITY OF NEW OREGON BANK COMBINE

SALEM, Ore., June 5.—(AP)—To ascertain whether the newly organized "Bancorporations" in Oregon are legal and whether they come properly under the jurisdiction of the state banking department or the state corporation department, Corporation Commissioner McCallister sent a letter today to Attorney General Van Winkle asking for a ruling on the question. The articles of incorporation for banks are filed with the state superintendent of banks, but the articles of the new "Bancorporations" have been filed with the corporation department.

The questions asked by McCallister were prepared by Bank Superintendent Schramm in after conference with the state banking board. It is Schramm's desire to get the attorney general's reply in time for discussion of the subject at the annual convention of the State Bankers' association at Newport next week.

PORTLAND ELECTRIC INVESTIGATION TO START ON JUNE 14

SALEM, Ore., June 5.—(AP)—Whether, in fixing a valuation of the properties of the Portland Electric Power company and the Northwestern Electric company, the public service commission shall start with a valuation of the former made in 1916 and consider consequent additions, or whether it shall fix new valuations from the ground up, are questions to be determined when the commission calls a hearing June 14 to investigate the rates of the two utilities.

The commission yesterday ordered a hearing of the residential lighting, heating and cooking rates and the commercial lighting and heating rates of the two concerns. The hearing will establish a precedent in that the commission ask the public to come in and assist in the probe, particularly to have a say as to the procedure.

W. A. Childers has rented the building belonging to Mrs. Blanche Cooy, adjoining the postoffice, where he will have his real estate office.

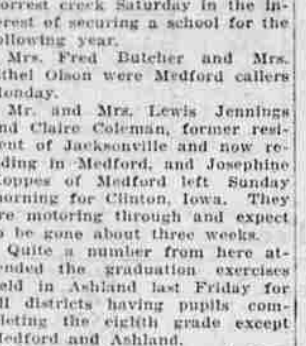
