MANILA, June 6.—(AP)—The national party, favoring a platform of non-cooperation in the plea for immediate independence for the

Philippine Islands, swept Manila in yesterday's election. Local returns indicated. No returns have been received from the provinces.

The national party won control of the city of Manila, which the democratic minority party has held during the last six years. Besides that the nationalists won a senatorship, one of two seats in the house, and all ten seats on the municipal council.

The democrats won only one house seat. Formerly they held every office except three seats on the municipal council.

Making its final pre-convention report, the senate investigating committee today listed the campaign expenditures of all presidential candidates in both parties at \$71,057.75, of which amount more than half was attributed to Secretary Hoover.

The expenditures of Hoover for the republican presidential nomination were placed at \$39,822.11. He headed the list of fifteen candidates headed by the committee, which has concluded its work until after the convention when it will examine election expenditures as well as other primary expenses.
