AIRPORT BONDING WILL BE SUSTAINED

If press dispatches are correct, and the only question to be
decided regarding the validity of airport bonds is whether
or not such bonds are for a "public purpose," this litigation
should prove no serious obstacle to the bonding of municipalities
for the construction of up-to-date flying fields.
One need not be an aerial enthusiast to admit that air trans-
portation is already an accomplished fact. For years airplanes
have carried the mails, now they are carrying express and pas-
sengers all over the country on regular schedule.
The construction of a municipal airport is certainly as clearly
for a "public purpose" as the construction of a municipal auto
camp, a municipal union station, or a municipal public market.
The action of the bond companies is undoubtedly due solely
to the fact that air transportation is such a recent development
that the courts have never ruled upon the subject. They want a
ruling. With conditions what they are, and public sentiment
what it is, there would seem to be no question that the courts
will establish the public character of air transportation as soon
as the issue is presented to them.

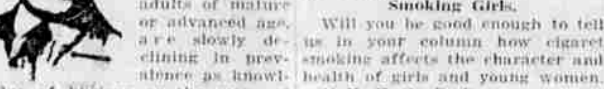

AN OUTLINE OF HYGIENE
No. 25.—Everybody Is As Young As He Thinks.

In the face of the gloomy de-
ductions of many students of health
drawn from the mortality
statistics, I believe not only that
there is no actual increase in can-
cer or in heart
artery (cardio-
vascular diseases)
but in truth these
groups of dis-
eases, so preva-
lent in a ma-
jority of adults
of advanced age,
are slowly de-
clining in fre-
quency as knowl-
edge of the ways
of health increases
among the popu-
lation at large. I have already ad-
mitted that we do not know enough
about cancer or cardiovascular
diseases to explain them clearly or
to lay down definite rules for those
who would avoid or prevent them.
This does not mean that we know
nothing about these diseases. Cer-
tainly we know enough about can-
cer to heed the warning signals and
apply proper treatment before the
disease reaches an incurable stage.
Likewise, our knowledge of heart
artery diseases, though far from
complete, is sufficient to stimulate
anyone who requires such stimu-
lation to obey the laws of hygiene.



The backbone saying that a
man is an old as his arteries, has
passed as wisdom ever since the
great Oser quoted it in the "doc-
tor's bible." Said he: "Longevity
is a vascular question, which has
been well expressed in the axiom
that 'man is as old as his ar-
teries.' To a majority of men,
death comes primarily or second-
arily through this portal. The an-
ger of what may be called phys-
iological arteriosclerosis depends
in the first place, upon the quan-
tity of arterial tissue (that rub-
ber) which the individual has in-
herited, and secondly upon the
amount of wear and tear to which
he has subjected it. That the for-
mer plays a most important role
is shown in the cases in which
it sets in early in life in individ-
uals in whom none of the recog-
nized etiologic (that is, medical)
cause for cumulative factors can be
found. Thus, for instance, a man
of 25 may have the arteries of a
man of 60 and a man of 40 may
present vessels as much degener-
ated as they should be at 80. En-
tire families sometimes show this
tendency to arteriosclerosis that
means hardening of the arteries—
a tendency which cannot be ex-
plained in any other way than that
in the makeup of the machine had
material was used for the tubing.
More commonly the arterio-scler-
osis results from the bad use of
good vessels."

Dr. Oser was a great teacher
and a great example for all young
medical students. Cushing's life
of Oser is still in my crude judg-
ment, the finest biography of mod-
ern times. But Dr. Oser was a
pessimist—not exactly that, other-
wise he would not have been a
fascinating teacher. This idea of
his, that poor material is used for
the construction of the arteries in
some individuals was pure fatalism.
Of course it does not refer to congenital or
"hereditary" disease, nor to nu-
tritional deficiency, but just to
some vague dismal fate that dog-
sore cannot understand. I hope I
may not seem presumptuous, for
surely I never the memory of the
beloved teacher; nor have I spe-
cial knowledge of eugenics or path-
ologies, or of heredity, but I be-
lieve there is nothing in the as-
sumption that some individuals in-
herit poor arteries—aside from re-
cognized congenital disease. I be-
lieve the family tendencies Dr. Os-
ler refers to are more reasonably
attributable to the natural ten-
dency of sons to follow in father's
footsteps, in their ways of life. For
instance, about eating, drinking,
occupation, recreation. In short,
I would revise the old saying. As
it stands, you are left with poor
arteries and an impulse to blame
it on grandfather. Never mind how
old the arteries are. Everybody is
as young as he thinks.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Hard Water.
We have always had a deep well
and hard water, and our children
get their teeth very early and have
good teeth. A neighbor had a shall-
ow well and soft water and their
children have poor teeth and get
their teeth very late. Now soft
water, our water, our water, and we
use their milk exclusively. Will this
have any effect on our health or
the health of the children?—B. H.

Answer.—No. It is questionable
whether the lime (calcium) and
other mineral elements in drink-
ing water are utilized by the body.
In any case, milk contains an ex-
cessively greater quantity of food
time for the body. If you still eat
fresh fruit, greens, vegetables,
beans, peas, peanuts, cabbage, it
doesn't matter whether the drink-
ing water is hard or soft.

Smoking Girls.
Will you be good enough to tell
us in your column how cigar-
ette smoking affects the character and
health of girls and young women.
—MRS. E. C. D. D.

Answer.—The effect on health is
the same as it is on boys and
young men. I do not think cigar-
ette smoking affects character at all.
I believe it is rather an indication
of a weak, undependable charac-
ter, when a young person takes up
this habit.

Salve for Toe Itch.
Quite a while ago you gave me
the formula for a salve for toe itch
or whatever the ringworm trouble
of the feet is called. We tried it
and it cleared up the trouble like
magic—a dozen or more men
in the army used it and it certainly
did the business. Now we have a
recurrence here, and unfortunately
no one kept a copy of the formula.

Answer.—I think it was Whit-
field's ointment—sulfuric acid 5,
benzoic acid 12, petroleum jelly
100 parts. It may be well to use
this only half strength at first—
mix it with an equal quantity of
petroleum jelly.

How-Legged Bimbo.
My boy just 2 years old is very
how-legged. Is it too late to do
something for him to correct this?
—Mrs. R. L.

Answer.—No. Diet and exercise
may still straighten the legs. See
that the boy has plenty of pure
fresh raw milk, butter, greens,
fruit. Let him cultivate a coat of
tan in sunlight and no clothing.
Feed him a tablespoonful of cod
liver oil daily. Get him a velocip-
ede or scooter to push. Ask your
doctor about splints or a flexible
brace.

Identify Bodies
IN CALIF. FLOOD
BIG PINE, Cal., June 6.—(AP)—A
25-foot wall of water which rushed
out of Big Pine creek canyon early
yesterday after being dammed up
behind an earth landslide, is be-
lieved to have swept two men and
a boy to their deaths in a torrent
that flooded this Owens valley
town with a foot of water.

The missing trio, who are believed
to have been drowned near their
camp on Sage Flats, were identified
as Lee Wiggin, 30, of 1619 South-
east Lake avenue, Los Angeles; his
14-year-old son, William, and R. H.
Hine of 409 East 21st street, Long
Beach.

Wiggin and his son climbed on
top of their automobile when the
roar of the oncoming flood awak-
ened them early in the morning.
The bodies which struck the car knocked
them into the torrent. The bodies
of the missing men have not been
recovered.
