

### FEARS BYRD WILL FLY OFF EDGE OF THE SOUTH POLE

NEW YORK, June 6.—(AP)—Wilbur Glenn Voliva, who firmly believes the earth is flat, fears Commander Richard E. Byrd will fly off the edge of it should he cross the Antarctic pole.

"If Byrd flies over those icy mountains," he said, "I'm afraid he'll never come back."

The overseer of Zion City, Ill., who returned on the Laconia yesterday from a four-month tour of Europe, enlarged upon his theory of the earth being flat.

"The world is flat as a plate and as round," he asserted, "there's a north pole certainly, in the center of that plate and the sun thoves around it like an orange."

"If you'll notice that the sun never goes any farther north than the tropic of Cancer and never any farther south than the tropic of Capricorn. This business of the sun setting and the sun rising is only an optical illusion. It doesn't prove that the earth is round."

Voliva said he expected to follow all developments of the Byrd expedition with intense interest.

### QUITS RACE RATHER THAN SUPPORT AL

DALLAS, Tex., June 6.—(AP)—Former Governor O. B. Colquitt has withdrawn from the race for the democratic nomination for United States senator from Texas, because of the "irrevocable nomination of Governor Alfred E. Smith for president," he said in a letter made public here today.

The letter stated he could not support Smith.

### ROGUE FISHERMEN TO CONSOLIDATE

GOLD BEACH, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—Consolidation of rival fishermen's organizations of the lower Rogue river has been effected with formation of the Rogue River Fishermen International Seaman's union. Jas. Leclair was named president. Members at a meeting Sunday decided to ask earlier opening of the salmon fishing season to allow catch of the early run which escaped up the river with the May 15 date extant.

### 3 ESCAPES FROM OREGON C. JAIL ARE CAPTURED

OREGON CITY, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—Three of the four prisoners who escaped from the Clatsop county jail yesterday were captured this morning. Lawrence Draper and Phillip Kipp, sentenced to seven and five years respectively, on bad check charges, were found by Night Officer Bladgett in a vacant house where they were asked. They offered no resistance. About the same time, Jack Livermore, alleged burglar, was found by Deputy Sheriff Thompson and Kelsacker as he was making his way out of town. He also submitted peacefully.

Joe Fogal, who was charged with having stolen brass from Oregon City mills, the fourth member of the jail party that escaped, was still at large, and officers believed he had made his way south along the Pacific highway.

OREGON CITY, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—Four men escaped from the county jail here today shortly after two of them had been given heavy prison sentences. They forced two locks and slipped away from the jail unnoticed.

They were believed to have commandeered an automobile in the street. The men were:

Lawrence Draper, who at 9:30 was sentenced to state prison for forgery.

Phillip Kipp, sentenced today to five years for forgery.

Jack Livermore, held on a burglary charge.

Joe Fogal, accused of taking brass from mills in Oregon City.

The men had been given the freedom of the jail corridor, because repairs to the jail sewer were being made. They evidently had found two doors leading from the corridor to an outside jail entrance.

### BUSINESS COLLEGE TO OPEN UP NEXT WEEK

### TALKING MOVIES IN THE HOME TO BE TRIED SOON

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 6.—(AP)—Great possibilities for radio are at hand, despite its amazing growth, H. P. Davis, vice president of the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing company declared in an address prepared for delivery today before the National Electric Light association.

He said that only the ground had been scratched and that the future will see big things in radio.

First, he pointed to television, which he said was an accomplished fact in the laboratories.

"It only remains to reduce it to practical form and make it available to the public," he added.

"The talking movie in the home also is just around the corner," he said. "At the start, this device will be actuated through the use of individual film records; later as a service of the broadcasting station."

"Apparatus now is developed in practical form whereby a message or picture can be transmitted in facsimile form. I conceive it possible to perfect a receiver that will automatically take the message from the broadcasting station as a printed communication. It will bring to the home the panorama of the life of the great world outside."

In discussing transmission of power by radio he declared that "it would be a foolish person who would undertake to say that this feat will never be accomplished, and things that now appear insurmountable may melt away in the sunlight of new discoveries."

### HILL LINES AGAIN ASKING FOR RIGHT TO FORM COMBINE

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 6.—(AP)—The unification plan of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific railroads would effect economies exceeding \$10,000,000 annually, the two roads declared in a brief made public here today.

The brief was prepared here for filing today with the interstate commerce commission at Washington. The commission has held five extended hearings on the proposal to merge the Northern and the Spokane, Portland and Seattle Railway company through a controlling organization to be known as the Great Northern Pacific Railroad company.

Unification would "result in operation and capital economies entailing to reduce the cost of producing transportation," the brief reads in setting forth that "the proposed unification will be in the public interest."

"The Northwest needs the lowest possible rates and best possible service, owing to the fact that it is primarily a producing section, sparsely settled and far removed from its consuming markets and is in active and direct competition with other regions more advantageously located and served by strong railroad systems."

### Mother, 8 Children, Adds 2 Dogs and 2 Deer to Her Family

COQUILLE, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—Two baby deer found near here by four Coquille boys were brought to town where members of the sheriff's force helped feed them from a whiskey bottle through a nipple.

Four sons of Mrs. Baylock, a widow, were allowed to take the fawns home. Mrs. Baylock now has a family of eight children, all under sixteen years, two dogs and two deer.

### WATSON DOUBTFUL HE CAN STOP HERB

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 6.—(AP)—Conferees on details of plans to prevent the nomination of Secretary Hoover at the republican national convention in Kansas City next week were held here today by United States Senator James E. Watson of Indiana with Missouri supporters of former Governor Frank O. Lowden of Illinois.

"It is only a question of whether Secretary Hoover can be stopped," Senator Watson, who is a candidate, was quoted by the Post-Dispatch as saying. "And I don't know whether he can be. If he is not nominated by the third ballot he cannot be nominated at all. In that event, anything can happen."

### LOVE TANGLE IS FATAL TO TWO CHICAGO GIRLS

CHICAGO, June 6.—(AP) Jealousy was believed by police to have led to the fatal shooting of two sweethearts by another man, known only as "Brownie," who is the object of a city-wide search today.

Mrs. Ruth Ward Lewis, 23, who has been separated from her husband and Paul Schilling, 25, an automobile mechanic, were the victims.

A sister, Elizabeth Ward, was fired upon but escaped injury. She told authorities the two had been sweethearts for two years but that last night her sister had been out with "Brownie." Later the two men met in the apartment occupied by the sisters. There was a quarrel and "Brownie" left. He returned later and killed both without warning.

### Tired of School, 13-Year-Old Boy Takes Bike Jaunt

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—Sought since yesterday, when he disappeared, Stanley Meyers, Jr., 13-year-old son of the district attorney of Multnomah county, was found this morning at Clatsop Crest, 25 miles from Astoria. He had ridden away with his bicycle equipped with knapsack, food and blankets.

"I was just tired of school and couldn't wait for vacation; that's all," was his explanation. His parents want to get him today.

### U. S. PEACE PACT PRAISED BY GREY

LONDON, June 6.—(AP)—Viscount Grey of Fallodon, presiding at a conference of arbitration held by the League of Nations unions, said that while the American outburst of war proposal has no direct connection with the league, it would be more apparent and helpful in its effect on the object of the league than anything that could be done within that body itself.

"It will be a very formidable thing in the future for any nation to break two such important things as the covenant of the league and the American peace pact," he said.

"If the American pact becomes a reality, any nation breaking it will have very little chance of securing the sympathy of American public opinion. The pact is not a reality but the prospects of its becoming so seem to me increasingly favorable."

### HERE'S A NEW WAY TO KILL A KING

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On Sunday last, Albert, with other members of the nobility, was to have participated in an automobile race. The racing officials found that the cars had been tampered with so that if high speed had been reached the racers would have been greatly endangered.

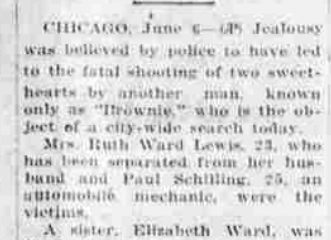
