**JAPAN WORRIED BY SITUATION IN MANCHURIA**

TOKYO, June 7.—(AP)—The Japanese newspapers are filled with alarmist stories and predictions about anti-Japanese feeling in Manchuria, movements of troops and Soviet intrigues.

The foreign office disseminated the press reports as without foundation and professed to be unperturbed. There were reports, however, that the government was probably more worried than it was ready to admit. It was realized that, should it prove necessary, it would be difficult to find a successor to Chiang Kai-shek, Manchurian war lord, who would be able to control that territory.

The Japanese government was principally concerned with the situation in Tientsin. It was stated that even the Japanese consul general there was unable to send a definite summary of the situation because of the presence of counteracting conflicting rumors in circulation. The government instructed the Japanese ambassador at Moscow to file protests with the Soviet government over alleged breaches of the new fisheries convention.

Hay, Feed and Pastures: Hay markets generally are improved because of the low condition of the new hay crop and the late intensity of pastures, but on the Pacific coast demand for old hay is not keen. New alfalfa was being contracted at Yakima at \$12.50 to growers the latter part of May.

Potatoes: Shipments of potatoes continue to exceed normal requirements. The inventory of old stock there is prospect of an early and second early potatoes judging from acreage and present condition of the fields. No definite information is yet available regarding the probable production

**MAIL ORDER KING AIDS STAR GAZING**

CHICAGO, June 7.—(AP)—A gift of \$500,000 from Max Adler, former Sears Roebuck and Company executive, for the construction of a planetarium on an island off Chicago's Lake Front near the Field museum, was announced today by Edward J. Kelly, president of the South Park commission.

The planetarium is a device designed to give the average person an opportunity to view the heavens as only astronomers heretofore have been able to do. It is so arranged that the instructor or operator can bring into the planetarium "sky" a view of the heavens as they appear at any given time, such as when the Egyptians viewed them or as they will appear hundreds of years hence.

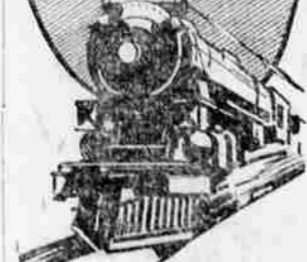
By working the apparatus the workings of the sky throughout a year can be reduced in the space of a few minutes time.

**Weekly Farm Market Review**

COVALLIS, Ore., June 7.—(AP)—Private crop estimators released reports last week which generally indicated improvement in the winter wheat crop but poorer prospects for spring wheat. The net result of these early estimates, which may prove high or low according to their present reliability and the effect of growing conditions during the rest of the season, is an indicated crop in the United States of 105,000,000 bushels of all wheat less than last year. As has been brought out in previous reports, the shortage will be in soft red winter wheat, a type which is low in protein and is in demand for making biscuit and pastry flour. Harvesting is expected to begin in the southwest which, with improved crop conditions in Europe, tend to weaken both domestic and export markets last week. Some decline was noted in barley under influence of less demand and improved new crop conditions. Cash corn was firm, although new crop conditions are more favorable.

Dairy Products: Pacific coast butter markets were firm to higher last week, with prices a cent or more above the level of a year ago. Eastern markets were somewhat unsettled with storage operators still slow in taking hold at present prices until more is known about the volume of production which will come from improved pastures. In the meantime, stocks in storage are now materially below a year ago in contrast to the situation on May 1, and production, while increasing rapidly during the last two seasons, is still short of last year at this date. Supplies of medium and lower grades are more liberal than good butter and the latter is moving most freely in the markets. Copenhagen and other markets have declined somewhat recently, the quotation on May 24 being 34.6 cents against 36.1 cents a week earlier.

Livestock: The first spring lambs from the northwest arrived in the eastern markets last week, selling at highest prices since war days. However, only the choice lambs brought the fancy prices. Cold spring weather has delayed lamb marketing this season so that large runs are not expected before the middle of June or later.

Spiegel, who is associated with his father in the furniture business, met Miss Lamphier while she was playing a theatrical engagement here a year after she had won the Atlantic City beauty crown.
