## CHILDREN HAVE A MERRY TIME AT NAT SWIM

Over 200 people took to the water at the Merrick natatorium today during the second classes of the annual Red Cross swimming drive under the supervision of George Hughling, instructor at University of California, who will be here for ten days.

This morning at 9 the pool was filled with girls from seven to 14 years of age. Timid little maids who couldn't get their feet off the bottom of the tank at the order to "float," were urged to give up the crabby attitude. And they did. Mr. Hughling is recognized as the best swimming teacher on the coast and for the past three years the Jackson county Red Cross tried unsuccessfully to get him here.

Each day lessons begin at 8 o'clock, boys who are just learning, going in at that time. From 9 to 10 the beginning class of girls are instructed and following that advanced classes combining men and women swimmers, have the tank. Latest methods in life saving and endurance tests are part of the daily program. After dinner from 7 to 8 o'clock the Natatorium is reserved for older women.

Miss Lillian M. Roberts executive secretary of the organization is assisting in the registration, and Misses Golda Boone, Anna May and Clara Mary Fuson are helping the instructor.

## WOMEN INVITED TO MAIL TRIBUNE COOKING SCHOOL

Housekeepers of Medford and southern Oregon will have a chance to sharpen their judged enthusiasm for cooking when Miss Victoria Warner, nationally known dietitian and home economics expert, comes to this city next week to conduct a cooking school which is being sponsored by the Mail Tribune and the newly reorganized Southern Oregon Gas corporation.

Miss Warner, a graduate of the University of Wisconsin and connected with the home service bureau of the Tappan Stove company, will give a series of educational lectures on making every-day cooking interesting, and the housewives will be able to apply to their own family needs.

Miss Warner, who is a well known food expert, will work here under the supervision of the Southern Oregon Gas corporation, and will conduct classes in cooking each afternoon of Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, June 12, 13, 14 and 15, from 2 until 4:30 in the Presbyterian church. The lecturer has had a very thorough training and experience, being a graduate dietitian of the University of Wisconsin and has had a number of years' experience in teaching dietetics and home economics. More recently she has been directing model kitchens and conducting cooking classes for housewives of different cities in Nebraska. As Miss Warner has been specializing and working a number of years in home economics work, she has been selected to give women here the benefit of her experience because she can present it to them in such a way that it will not only be educational but practical.

Miss Warner will be able to give new recipes and original suggestions that will re-create once again joy in many kitchens, and come smiles to again appear on the faces of difficult families.

One nice part about these classes—for they are classes, and not merely demonstrations—is the charming personality and gracious service which Miss Warner will show local women during the several hours she is teaching some of the significant things about cooking which she has learned.

These classes are, of course, entirely gratis, and are open to every woman of Medford and the Rogue River valley, whether she is cooking in tiny kitchenette or managing the diet for a large family. They are to be quite informal and are to be featured with daily intermissions during which guests may discuss with their neighbors the pros and cons of the things they have just heard.

Thousands of women throughout the country have availed themselves of the opportunity of attending these classes and invariably Miss Warner has been asked to give a return engagement.

## ALL COUNTIES HAVE PAID STATE TAXES

SALEM, Ore., June 7.—(AP)—All counties in the state have completed their payments to the state treasurer of the first half of state taxes for 1928, aggregating \$2,730,935.75. The general fund of the state gets \$1,887,323.42 of this amount, the one-mill market road fund \$562,208.27 and the war veterans' state aid sinking fund \$281,404.06.

On June 1 there was in the state treasury \$4,911,127.51 in cash. On June 1, last year, the amount was \$3,288,819.51. The total amount in the state's general fund on June 1 was \$995,366.69, which with corporation fees to be collected July 1 and various miscellaneous fees will have run the state until December 1 when the counties pay in the second half of their state taxes.

To retire the second installment of \$200,000 of the war veterans' state aid bonds and pay the interest due the state will on July 1 make a payment of \$205,315. On August 1, the state will distribute \$400,000 in interest on the common school fund.

## LOCAL FISHERMEN DISCUSS MATTERS WITH CLIFFORD

The Rogue River committee met with State Game Warden Clifford yesterday afternoon for a tour of inspection of the Savage Rapids and Gold Ray dams. Some much needed improvements were considered and ways and means devised for the necessary outlay.

Under the supervision of Ralph Cowgill, who is in charge of the work now being done on Rogue river, a channel has been provided at the Gold Ray dam for the use of the young steelhead and salmon on their migration to the sea. This channel routes the fish in such a manner that they avoid the turbines of the power plant and thus are assured of a safe journey past the dam.

An interesting experiment in the shape of an electrified screen is being tested at the Gold Ray dam. This device is charged with about 85 volts and its purpose is to prevent fish from ascending the channel leading directly into the power plant. It has been determined that the voltage discourages the salmon from trying to pass the screen, yet does no apparent harm to the fish should he decide to investigate closely.

After the inspection members of the committee and representatives of the Isaac Walton club of Grants Pass enjoyed a very pleasant dinner at the Weisku Inn. Mr. Clifford outlined some of the plans of the game commission in regard to the restocking program and an informal discussion was held concerning the problems confronting the workers.
