## Sports STRANGLER HERE FOR TITLE BOUT ARMORY TONIGHT

Ed (Strangler) Lewis arrived this afternoon from Marshfield for his world's heavyweight wrestling match tonight at the armory with Hill Shaw, heavyweight champion of Ohio, under the auspices of the American Legion drum corps. Lewis threw Wallace Fuld, Canadian champion, at Marshfield last night in straight falls and plans on repeating the performance when he wrestles Shaw tonight.

However, Lewis is expected to have more trouble than he anticipates, due to Shaw's speed, which the challenger holds as his main strength against the heavier champion. Lewis' championship belt was to be placed on exhibition this afternoon at a local jewelry store or at the Chamber of Commerce. The belt is diamond studded and valued at \$10,000.

Shaw declared himself today to be in perfect condition and ready for the champion. The challenger has been preparing for this match for the past month and has spared no effort in working out in order to improve his condition.  
Tonight's semi-windup promises to be a freight with action with Jack Roller, former world's amateur heavyweight wrestling champion and present holder of two world's records in weight lifting, wrestling Tommy O'Brien of Seattle or possibly Wallace Fuld, who wrestled Strangler Lewis at Marshfield last night. Roller has wrestled Lewis and defeated the champion once in Washington, D. C. However, the defeat came before Lewis won the championship and Roller has not wrestled Lewis for some time.  
In another preliminary Sailor Jack Wood will wrestle William Sandahl, according to present plans, which may possibly not be carried out. A curtain raiser wrestling event between two high school boys will open tonight's smoker, which begins at 8:45.  
The American Legion drum corps will parade the down town streets this evening in uniform and will play several selections at the armory. Orchestra music will also be supplied during the match by the Dyke Brothers' orchestra.

## HOT GAME WITH DUNSMUIR TEAM EXPECTED SUNDAY

What promises to be one of the most hotly contested games of the season will be played next Sunday at the Jackson County Fair Grounds when the Medford team books up with the Dunsmuir club composed of nearly all old league players. As yet Manager Hall has not come to terms with any new pitcher as none can get any satisfactory. Bill Baker, the sensational pitcher from Eugene, has only been out of the hospital six weeks and wants to be sure he is right before agreeing to come to Medford, and will pitch another game for Eugene next Sunday in order to test his strength.

Nevertheless Medford will have three pitchers, Hughes, Pernoll and Schoeni. Dr. Carpenter says he can have Michels' arm in shape for the game with Klamath Falls June the 17th. Michels will try his arm out on Saturday in order to test it to pitch in Sunday's game.  
The Medford outfield and infield will be the strongest this season in Sunday's game. Ken Robie, the fast little short stop from U. of O., will be in the lineup, and is also bringing a hard-hitting outfielder that can be used as an emergency batter.

## MINISTER, ONCE A FLASH, TRAINS FOR OLYMPIC CONTEST

BOSTON, Mass., June 7.—(AP)—An athletic marvel has been performed by Harold Cutbill, once known as the "Flying Parson," and one of the fastest miler that ever stepped on an American track.  
Several months ago Cutbill, who retired from amateur competition seven years ago when charges of professionalism were brought against him, resorted to Jack Ryder, member of the Olympic coaching staff, and said he was determined to stage a comeback and make the Olympic team, since the charges were long ago disproved.  
Cutbill then weighed 180 pounds. His body was soft and his muscles flabby, just as those of country clergymen generally are. During the long layoff Cutbill had been devoting himself to ministerial duties in a small rural parish at Hoxford, Mass.

Hoxford was amazed, but he knew the gritty churchman and prescribed a course of training. Day after day and week after week Cutbill kept pounding around the Boston college track. During the early stages of his training his times would shame a high school freshman miler, but gradually the parson rounded into form.  
Today he is running the mile well under 4:20 and Ryder claims he will be at 4:15 in the Olympic tryouts.

Another interesting comeback effort is being made by Jourdin, the former Harvard broad jumper. Six years ago he amazed the athletic world by leaping 25 feet in an Oxford-Cambridge Harvard-Yale meet at the stadium. This record was later broken by Bob Legendre, former Georgetown star, and De Hart Hubbard, present holder of the broad jump record.

## GROVER ALEXANDER KNOCKED OUT BUT TEAMMATES WIN

The National league race was a bit tighter today as the result of a let-up in inclement weather.  
Brooklyn enjoyed a fine batting afternoon again. Ray Kops, Carl Mays and Jim Edwards as Douglass McWeeney turned back Cincinnati's forces monotonously for seven innings. Something cracked in McWeeney's service at this point and the Reds piled up five purely decorative runs in two innings as Rube Ehrhardt rushed to the rescue. The score was 8 to 5.  
The fighting Cards are thankful for whatever success they can register on the field, but they are able to take only slight comfort from their 11 to 6 victory over the Giants at the Polo grounds yesterday. McKeeble's men rallied gamely to win, but the showing of Grover Cleveland Alexander in the first two innings convinced the baseball sharps that the veteran right-hander will be useless to the St. Louis club for a few weeks more at the least. Alex has a sore elbow.

The Cubs improved their position somewhat by defeating the Phils 5 to 3, but Joe McCarthy, in panic as the home team began to hit in the seventh, used up Malone, Bush and Jones in turning in the victory.  
Herb Pennekot obtained revenge against the Indians for the game they won from him at the Yankee stadium last month. He clicked off his ninth victory of the season, 3 to 3, as George Uhle took another beating.  
Howard Ehmke and Eddie Rommel of the Athletics failed to halt the young sluggers of Dan Howley who won 5 to 2 behind the good pitching of Sam Gray. The Yanks lead by a mere nine games.
