SCRATCH SAILING BOAT IN HAWAII RACE IS LEADING

LOS ANGELES, June 8.—(AP)—The 192-foot sloop Talaya, largest of six craft racing across the Pacific to the Island of Hawaii, today had covered more than 600 miles and with trade winds at her back, was fast nearing her goal. In a radio message to the Associated Press at 7:45 o'clock last night the craft reported she had covered 490 miles since the race got under way last Sunday at Newport Harbor, Cal. Under full sail she has been making an average of 14 to 15 knots an hour since encountering the trade winds and on Wednesday logged an "over steam" mileage of 240 miles. Telling right about the yacht apparently has left the five other craft some distance behind. The Talaya, a scratch boat in the race, carries a much greater spread of sail than the other yachts, none of which are over 65 feet in length.

Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, June 8.—(AP)—Speculative uneasiness over monetary conditions which was intensified by the increase of nearly \$100,000,000 in brokers' loans last week, was reflected in a sharp downward readjustment of prices in today's stock market. Extreme losses in the active issues ranged from two to nearly ten points during the afternoon. In view of the sharp increase in prices last week, the huge expansion of loans came as a surprise and was generally attributed to the heavy financing of new securities offerings. Call money was in such plentiful supply that the renewal rate was fixed at 5 1/2 per cent as against six yesterday and 6 1/2 the day before. The closing was heavy. Radio rose to 129 in the late afternoon where it was six points beyond its closing price yesterday. Short covering occurred in other stocks when the Chicago bank made no change in its discount rate, much of the late selling having been predicated on belief that an increase was imminent. Many stocks were heading downward again the final hour. International Harvester selling at 264, more than ten points below its price in the early flurry of buying. Total sales approximated 3,200,000 shares.
