PORTLAND, Ore., June 8.—(AP)—"We have them. We'll send their bodies later," said a collect telegram received at the home of J. S. Phillips after Stella Phillips, 15,

and Marian Luciano, 14, disappeared from the Phillips home last night. Police believed the girls themselves sent the message. The girls went to their room at 9:00 o'clock. An hour later Mrs. Phillips missed them and a telephone call with garbled words was received shortly after 10 o'clock. Then came the telegram.
