LAST MONTH WAS DRYEST MAY IN LOCAL HISTORY

The past month had the lightest rainfall for the month of May in the history of the Medford weather bureau, the total rainfall amounting to only one hundredth of an inch. Although a slight amount of rain fell on seven days during May, it was only on May 5 that a measurable amount fell, according to the official summary of L. Walter Dick, meteorologist in charge of the Medford bureau. "This summary is, in part, as follows:—

"The monthly mean temperature for May was 62.3 degrees, a departure of 5.1 degrees above the past average for the month. Maximum temperatures of 90 degrees or over were reached on two days. The highest for the month, 98.2 degrees, on the 24th, was also the highest of all record for May, exceeding the previous high record, reached in 1922, by 1 degree. The lowest temperature for the month was 39.9 degrees on the third.

"The total rainfall was the lightest of record, only 0.01 inch being measured, a deficiency of 1.90 inch, as compared with the past average for May. Altogether rain fell on seven days, but only on the 5th was the amount measurable.

"Killing frosts formed on the first three days. Damage was not general, but early tender vegetables suffered to some extent, especially on the third. There was fairly heavy smogging on all three days. Fruits did not suffer any frost damage.

"Thunderstorms occurred on 3 days. Four solar halos were observed. Light fog formed on one occasion, and light smoke was noted on seven days, on one of which dense smoke was also recorded."

HIGH OFFICIALS AND POLICE IN LIQUOR TANGLE

PITTSBURG, June 9.—(AP) Indictments charging 147 persons, including Superintendent of Police Peter P. Walsh, two members of the state legislature and two police magistrates, with conspiracy to violate the prohibition laws, were returned by a federal grand jury here today.

Indictments followed weeks of investigation by the grand jury of charges that there were extensive conspiracies to violate the prohibition laws throughout the city. Federal authorities had claimed that city officials would be embezzled in the probe and several clashes between city and federal authorities occurred while the investigation was being pressed.

Sam J. Grenet and Lullie Sullivan, former members of the legislature, were among those named in the indictments. Scores of alleged illicit liquor manufacturers and bootleggers also were named.

TALENT ARRESTS HIS ARRESTER AS PLOT THICKENS

Sergeant Charles P. Talent, sergeant in charge of the state traffic department, who was arrested last Tuesday night by Marshal Bob Metzger for parking on the wrong side of the street, late yesterday afternoon arrested Marshal Metzger for the same offense.

The complaint against Talent, scheduled for hearing this afternoon before Justice J. L. Roe of Jacksonville, was postponed until next Friday. The case against Metzger died suddenly, as somebody tore up the "ticket."

Talent arrested Marshal Metzger when, according to Metzger's friends, efforts to induce him to withdraw his complaint against Talent failed. Metzger was working at the city reservoir and had his car parked on the only parking spot along that narrow road, which is used only as an ingress to the Jacksonville road. Metzger adherents admit he was parked on the wrong side of the road, but maintain it was the only place to park. Captain Bloom of the state traffic department is in the city and conferred yesterday with Jacksonville authorities relative to adjusting the tangle out of court. So far little headway has been made in this direction.

The city council of Jacksonville, according to well-informed reports, is standing back of Metzger, and his friends have taken up a fund to fight the case "to the highest court."
