KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 9.—(AP) With high scores in all events featuring the first two days of the Oregon State trap shoot now under way in this city, Frank M. Troch, Portland, American trap-shooting champion tied with Everett Hardenbrook, Klamath Falls, in the first half of the 200-bird state title shoot today, each shattering 100 birds straight.

Last half of the state championship shoot will be staged Sunday, closing day of the trap tows.

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BEAVERS SHUT OUT STANFORD VICTOR CHILDREN TO GIVE PROGRAM TODAY

CHICAGO, June 9.—(AP)—A sturdy band of eleven Californians, proudly wearing the Cardinal colors of Leland Stanford university, scored an overwhelming triumph in the national collegiate track and field championships on Soldier field today, annexing 72 points in an afternoon of record-breaking performances.

The meeting drawing 333 of the nation's finest athletes, representing 79 universities and colleges, a fight for Olympic team recognition, resulted in tying the world's record for the 100 yard dash and before the onslaught was finished eight records for the games were smashed and two were equalled.

The Californians, winner of the eastern intercollegiate championship, undefeated in team competition this spring, amassed more than twice as many points as their nearest challenger, Illinois, which scored 26 3/4 points for second place honors.

The Illinois, western conference champions, barely beat out Ohio State which finished third with 39 points.

The University of Washington, Pacific coast champions, was fourth with 26 points.

Eric Krenz, the dark, brawny Californian, led the scoring of the Cardinal team by winning the discus with a record-breaking heave of 149 feet 2 inches and placing second to his team mate, Rothert, in the shot. Spencer, the bespectacled member of the Stanford team, established a new record for the 440-yard run when he beat Russell Walters, the Northwest sophomore, to the tape by a yard after a sensational race in :47.7.

Kimunde, star vaulter of the Stanford squad, annexed a third record for the coast invaders, when he cleared the bar at 13 feet 6 1/2 inches.

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RAINIER, Ore., June 9.—(AP)—A cabinet form of government for the state was endorsed by the Oregon State Grange and the Grange will get behind a movement to have an initiative bill put on the ballot for the fall election. Petitions were distributed among the delegates to the convention, which closed here last night, and these will be circulated.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 9.—(AP) Taking on the festive dress for its annual celebration in honor of the year, Portland was decorated today and final preparations were being made for the presentation next week of the pageant "Where Rolls the Oregon." The pageant, with hundreds of performers in colorful costume and special music will be given each night next week at the municipal stadium except Saturday.

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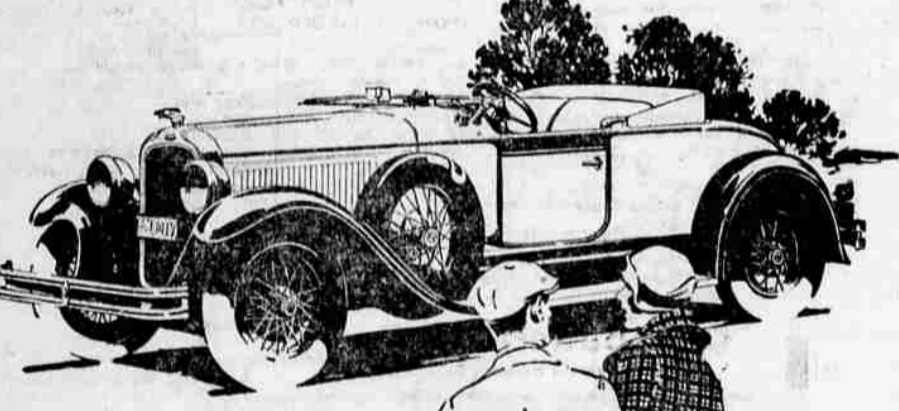
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
