TEXACO AIRPLANE LEAVES; CROWDS INSPECT MACHINE

Following a night spent in Medford, the large three-motored Texaco, Ford all-metal monoplane, left this morning shortly before 9:25 for Seattle, Wash., planning to fly straight through from Medford to the Puget Sound city.

The plane, which arrived here last evening from Corning, Calif., is due to return to Detroit, Mich., June 22, and will take part in the national air reliability tour and will probably be in Medford again during the middle of July.

The plane has thus far traveled 20,000 miles and has been in the air four months, during which time it has visited all the southern states and midwest. En route to Detroit from Medford, the stops will be limited, according to Captain Frank Hawks, pilot of the ship.

Captain Hawks, before leaving this morning, declared that the Texaco ship is equally as large as any other ship that has landed at the local airport. He went on to say that the Texaco is identical with the other Ford ship which was here last week and which is scheduled to land here this afternoon, with the exception of equipment.

The flight of the Texaco plane has three distinct purposes, said Captain Hawks, the first one of which is for the experimental flying of Texaco products in aircraft in order to determine how such products respond in all manner of weather.

The second purpose outlined is an experiment in order to determine the usefulness of aircraft as an operating unit for the company. The last purpose announced is a stimulant to aviation, encouraging interest of the public in aircraft.

Captain Hawks, who has piloted the ship since it was purchased at a cost of \$50,000 by the company, is well known in aviation circles and last year won the Detroit News transport race in Spokane, Wash. He also flew a sister ship to the Spirit of St. Louis from San Diego, Calif., to Washington, D. C., to welcome Colonel Charles Lindbergh upon his return to the United States from his trans-Atlantic flight.

In speaking of the local airport, Captain Hawks declared it was inadequate to care for the needs of present day aviation and that it is highly probable that the majority of the ships of the national reliability air tour will pass over Medford when the tour with its more than 30 planes comes through southern Oregon next month.

MEDFORD GUARDS LEAVE TONIGHT FOR 'BIG CAMP'

Quite a large delegation of relatives and friends of the officers and enlisted men of Company A, 18th Infantry, the local unit of the National Guard, will be at the depot this evening to bid the command farewell, when they board the special train at 6:30 p. m., on which will also be the Ashland Coast Artillery company, the Grants Pass and Roseburg Infantry companies and some of the western Oregon units bound for Portland, enroute to the state National Guard encampment of 15 days at Camp Clatsop.

The other units of the Guard throughout the state will reach Portland early tomorrow evening, and then the entire number of about 400 soldiers will board eight special military trains for Camp Clatsop. From 6:30 a. m. the trains will depart from Portland at regular intervals, and the last train is expected to reach Camp Clatsop at 2:30 p. m.

L. A. BANKS SEES A BUMPER CROP AND HIGH PRICES

After looking over his pear orchards, L. A. Banks, fruit grower with interests in California and Oregon, reports that the prospects are bright for a bumper crop, which will be ripe earlier than usual and probably sell at a high price.

Mr. Banks came here with his family last week from Riverside, Calif., where he owns one of the largest acreages of orange trees in that locality. A \$250,000 crop, he says, has just been harvested from his 400 acres. Property values have advanced by leaps and bounds in that state during the past few years, some land being sold for \$2000 per acre.

Extensive advertising of oranges as one of the health foods accounts for the high price and big demand for the fruit, Mr. Banks believes. "The Rogue River valley is just coming into its own, and I think that with the right kind of cooperation among orchardists that property here will show the same marked improvement that has taken place in California," Mr. Banks said in discussing the possibilities of this locality.

"This valley should be widely advertised not only as one of the most beautiful spots in America in which to reside, but as being especially adapted climatically, with ideal soil, to produce the finest quality pears of all varieties grown anywhere in the world."

Pear orchards which Banks operates here are the Taylor Pepper on the highway at Voorhes crossing, Emerick, Brookhurst, Hampton and several smaller ones. He has been in the fruit growing business for over 40 years.

GWIN, WHITE AND PRINCE FORM A FOREIGN DEPT.

Of interest to southern Oregon fruit growers is the announcement of Gwin, White & Prince, Inc., of Seattle in regard to the sales report of 1927, with a total of \$3,307,382.92 received for fresh fruit sales, with less than a score of cars of the 1927 crop as yet unaccounted for. The company also announces the consolidation of its foreign trade activities in a newly organized department to be known as the foreign trade department in charge of J. A. Smith, late manager of the import and export department of the Messrs. Dowdell & Company, Ltd.

The sales report breaks all records for the organization, which acts as sales managers for 15 growers' packing and shipping organizations in the Wenatchee-Okanogan section of Washington and for nine other packing organizations in other parts of Washington and Oregon. The new crop for 1928 promises to be substantially larger than last year's and this sales organization is already engaged in preparing the marketing campaign in mid-August, when the annual convention of the International Apple Shippers' association is held.

Very rapid strides have been taken in the past two years both in method and volume of foreign distribution of Pacific northwest apples and pears. For years, foreign outlets were available to northwestern growers only on a consignment basis, but this system, economically unsound, has been entirely abandoned by the Gwin, White & Prince, Inc., and the business has been converted to a firm sale basis. Local ships at American ports. The breaking down of time honored customs, favorable to foreign receivers, has been a task of considerable magnitude, but persistent effort, supported by intelligent and loyal cooperation of carefully chosen resident foreign agents, has resulted, the company claims, in complete success.

This new system has resulted in a doubling of foreign exports for the company in spite of adverse competitive conditions in the European markets, which is the main outlet for exports, which are also sent to Central and South America, West Indies, Egypt, South Africa, China, Java, India, The Straits Settlements and Japan.

So far as known, Gwin, White & Prince, Inc., is the first organization connected with the fruit industry of the northwest to segregate its foreign business from its domestic business, giving the foreign trade the benefits of a specialized department under the management of a specially trained executive.

COPCO OFFICIALS GIVE TESTIMONY IN GOLD HILL CASE

W. M. Shepard, vice-president of the California Oregon Power company, was the first witness called by the defense in the condemnation suit of the city of Gold Hill against the utilities corporation, when the plaintiff closed its case. Gold Hill is seeking condemnation of a parcel of land on the banks of Rogue river for the construction of a municipal power plant.

Shepard declared it was the intention of the California Oregon Power company to develop the site in litigation "within the next few years, or sooner if necessary required." It was also testified by Shepard that more power could be developed by his company than by individual companies at the site, and that in the last twelve years the power output of Copco had increased tenfold. He read from company statistics to confirm this.

Under cross examination by Attorney Gus Newbury, Shepard admitted that power developed here was distributed in northern California and southern Oregon counties, particularly in Douglas. He testified that a considerable portion of the power produced at the Prospect plant was thus disposed of. The defense questioned the witness from a report filed with the public service commission of Oregon. A vigorous denial was entered to a question that Copco was seeking a monopoly of sites.

Most of the plaintiff witnesses were residents of Gold Hill and their testimony dealt largely with the value of the property, contending it was worth from \$300 to \$500.

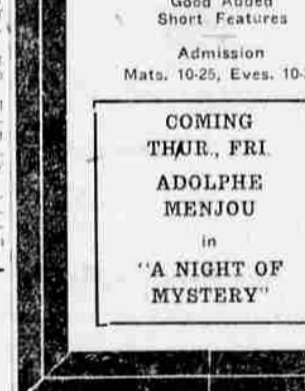
