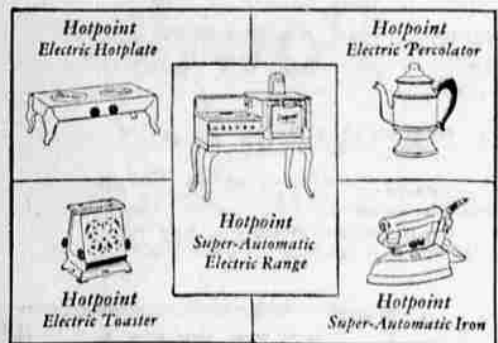

OREGON'S CHOICE FOR V. PRESIDENT IS GEN. DAWES

CONVENTION HALL, KANSAS CITY, June 14.—(AP)—With the possibility in sight that John H. Hall, Oregon's primary preference for vice-president, might release the state's delegation from its obligation to cast its first ballot for him, members were looking today for a candidate for second place on the ticket upon whom they can unite. The candidate mentioned frequently among the delegation, but always with the proviso that he meet with the approval of Hoover, was Vice-President Dawes. Ex-service men on the delegation, although sympathetic with aspirations of Hanes and MacVider, seemed inclined to prefer Dawes.

Others suggested as men who might receive favorable consideration of the Oregon delegates in-

cluded James G. Harbord and Senator Moses of New Hampshire.

The Oregon delegates regarded the report of the resolutions committee today with considerable interest because of the fact that it contained several planks offered by the state's delegation. These included Edgar J. Adams' proposals for increased federal aid for national forest roads and increased appropriation for development of Pacific coast rivers and harbors.

Another plank of considerable interest to the Oregon delegation was the declaration for enforcement of the eighteenth amendment. Although sponsored by Senator Harrah, the plank was regarded by William F. Woodward of Portland as embodying all the essentials of his resolution on the subject which he submitted to the platform committee bearing the signatures of all the Oregon delegates.

Consideration of the platform appeared to be a relatively minor matter in the minds of most of the delegation, compared with today's expected climax of the convention which they were confident would be Hoover's nomination on an early ballot for president. The delegation was under primary instructions to cast its vote solidly for the secretary of commerce.

MONMOUTH NORMAL STUDENTS SHREATHEN TO MAKE TROUBLE

SALEM, Ore., June 14.—(AP)—A group of Oregon normal school students from the Monmouth institution, while in Salem yesterday, said that they will request the next state legislature to investigate the school relative to operation and control exercised by the board of regents, particularly with reference to the employing and removal of instructors. The students made the announcement after they had conferred with Attorney General Van Winkle as to what could be done toward an impartial investigation.

The proposed investigation would involve not only the recent removal of Professor Thomas H. Gentle, but also several other teachers in recent years. The students said their desire for an investigation implied no particular grievance against Miss Jessica Todd, dean of women, but they said relations between faculty and students are strained.

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WHEAT HEARING TO MOVE TO PORTLAND

SEATTLE, June 14.—(AP)—A triangular legal battle for the 79,000-acre bushel wheat crop of Montana, which is expected to be the most bitterly contested of the I. C. C.'s grain rate hearing here, was to start today.

And when the tumult and shouting of that battle dies, the capitalists and kings of the northwestern grain world will depart for Portland, where the interests centering about that port are to be given an opportunity to call their own witnesses to a hearing on the home grounds. For with the Montana grain rates question, the Seattle hearing will finish its business except a few scattered details or relative unimportance.

Attorneys representing the transcontinental railroads indicated that they would ask no change in the present Montana rates.

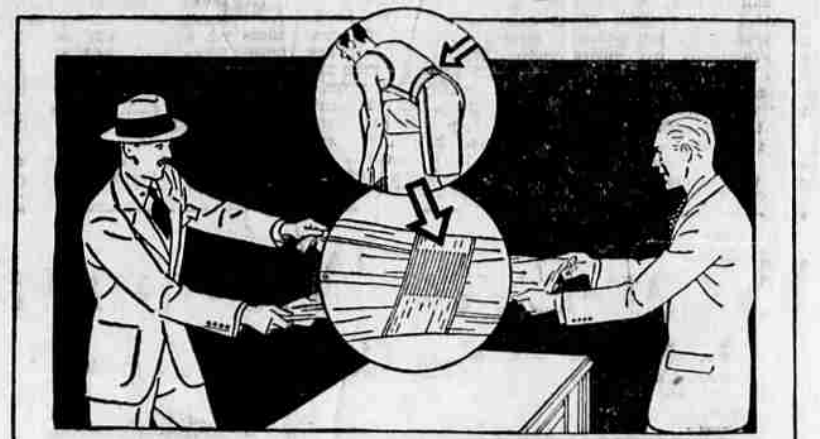

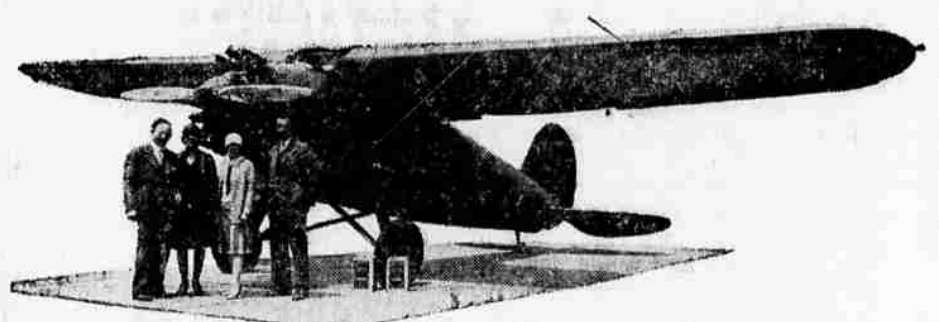
