

PROSPECT YOUTH IS HIT IN EYE BY A TOY TORPEDO

Frank Boothby, age 16 years, of Prospect, lies in the Sacred Heart hospital, his right eye mangled and torn and his sight imperiled, as the result of the explosion of a toy torpedo Wednesday evening about 9:30 o'clock. It was the first pre-fourth of July casualty of the year in the Rogue River valley.

Boothby, with a number of other youths of his own age, was playing in the road. The injured boy threw the torpedo against a rock. There was a flash and roar. Boothby screamed in pain and sank to the ground. A bit of rock, or foreign article in the torpedo, had been hurled into his eye, leaving a jagged wound. His playmates rushed for help.

He was brought to this city in an auto by his parents, James and Mrs. J. J. Emmons. The injured boy arrived about midnight when an emergency operation was performed. There is a chance removal of the eye will be unnecessary, but his vision, it is feared, will always be impaired. Every resource of medical science is being used in his behalf and today Boothby was reported as resting "as well as could be expected."

The torpedo that maimed the lad was decorated with the national colors, and labeled "Victory." They are exploded by throwing against a hard object, make a tremendous amount of noise for their size, and are in high demand among the boys.

AUTO COUNT SHOWS 3122 MACHINES ON HIGHWAY ONE DAY

An auto traffic count on the Pacific highway at the fairgrounds yesterday from 6 a. m. to 10 p. m., by A. H. Sunderman for the state traffic department, revealed that a total of 3,122 automobiles passed by during that time, including 949 machines from out of state points, and exclusive of 29 auto stages and several motorcycles.

Of the 949 machines from out of state points, cars came from all sections of the nation, including motorists from Maryland, New York, Illinois, Nebraska, Iowa, South Dakota, Nevada, Colorado, Texas, Wyoming, Montana, British Columbia, Kansas, Alabama and other states. The majority of the cars, however, came from Washington and California, with the latter state considerably in the lead.

Sunderman, the official counter, was of the opinion today that many of the middle western tourists were settlers in search of opportunities in Oregon.

CINNEBAR STRIKE IN SALT CREEK REGION

John K. Harrison of the Meadows district was in the city today, with a sample of mercury which he extracted from his cinnebar holdings in Salt creek. He says that an assay shows the cinnebar to run 47 per cent mercury, and that it is one of the richest cinnebar finds in a long time in this vicinity. He has uncovered a 50-foot ledge, and is making plans for its development at an early date.
