WOMAN AWARDED \$2025; TREICHLER SUIT IS STARTED

The damage suit of George L. Treichler, auto dealer, against J. R. Crews and his wife, Minnie Crews, began in the circuit court before Judge Orlando Corkins of Lakeview this morning. Treichler asks \$2000 for personal damage, \$200 for damage to auto, and \$129 for medical services.

The suit is an outgrowth of an auto accident at the South Fir and West Eleventh street intersection, on February 12, 1927. Treichler alleges that the auto driven by Mrs. Crews collided with the one driven by himself, due to the alleged "careless and negligent" driving of Mrs. Crews.

Treichler was the first witness called, and testified that he was traveling at the rate of 20 miles per hour when the accident occurred. He said he had endeavored to get across in front of the Crews car but failed. In response to a defense question, he denied that Mrs. Crews after the accident had offered to take him to a doctor, but testified that she had offered to take him "to a hospital," to which he protested.

The defense is represented by Attorney L. A. Beckon of Portland, and W. E. Crews of this city. The plaintiff is represented by Attorney Porter J. Neff.

In the damage suit of Mrs. Lorena Cullie against Ed B. Hanley and C. C. Hoover, a jury late yesterday after 45 minutes deliberation returned a verdict in favor of Mrs. Cullie for \$2025. She asked for \$2025.
