## ADVENTISTS ARE READY FOR CAMP MEETING OPENING

Everything is in readiness for the opening service of the Seventh Day Adventist camp meeting, which is being held in Jacksonville. Members from the various churches of the conference have been pouring into the city all day. The delegates are being located in the tents and rooms provided.

Ministers from the general conference, with headquarters at Washington, D. C., are here to lead in the services and will bring reports of the progress of the work throughout the world field. The field secretaries and officials of the North Pacific Union conference also are present and will discuss plans and policies for the advancement and upbuilding of the denominational work in this section of the field. Rev. Cecil K. Meyers, secretary of the general conference, who has just returned from a world trip, will speak tonight in the large canvas pavilion right back of the Bid United States hotel. Service will be held at 7:30 o'clock and the public is cordially invited.

The work of the denomination is being pushed rapidly in all countries of the world and more than 25,000 converts from the foreign fields alone were added to the church last year.

The Adventists are operating 55 large publishing houses, with book sales totaling nearly five million dollars last year. These books, covering every phase of Christian experience, together with doctrinal themes and explanations of prophecy, are on exhibition at the camp grounds and will be sold at the regular camp meeting discounts.

Nearly six million dollars in tithes was paid by the members of the organization last year, while more than 12 million dollars was given in mission offerings, an amount of over \$43 for each member of the church.

The Adventists believe that the Lord Jesus will return to this earth in this generation, which seems to be the motive back in their liberal giving and great activity in the propagation of the points of faith peculiar to themselves. They believe in temperance, refraining from the use of tobacco, stimulants, liquors and all other narcotics which would have a tendency to weaken the vital forces, thus making themselves susceptible to disease.

The camp meeting will continue until the 24th of June. The daily program is as follows:

Forenoon: Rising bell, 5:30; devotion, 6 to 7; breakfast, 7 to 8; prayer bands, 8:15 to 9; children, 9 to 10; Bible study, 10:15 to 10:30; sermon, 10:45 to 12; Afternoon: Dinner, 12:30 to 1:30; Bible study, 2:30 to 3:30; round table, 4 to 5; young people, 4 to 5; children, 4 to 5; supper, 6 to 7; sermon, 7:30 to 9.

An invitation is extended to all.

## 2 WORLD WAR VETERANS PUT IN LOCAL JAIL

E. H. Best and Emory Davis, two world war veterans, left Medford this morning in the custody of United States Deputy Marshal Loren Cochran for Portland, where they will be given a trial in the United States district court on charges of illegally occupying forest reserve land in the Fish Creek district near Diamond Lake. They arrived at 8 o'clock last evening and spent the night in the county jail, where this morning they declared they would fight the move to oust them from the lands to the bitter end.

Best declared the constitution of the United States gave them the valid privilege to remain and that, until the present, they have not been given an opportunity to state their side of the case. However, should the forthcoming trial prove that their rights are invalid, Best said he and Davis both will be ready to move off immediately—as soon as they can drive a car to their mountain cabins.

The Roseburg American Legion has reported to be adding the two men, one of whom, Davis, is crippled with rheumatism, by financing attorney fees. Senator Burton K. Wheeler of Montana is interested in the case. He has written a letter this morning from the senator, encouraging the two men. Senator Charles McNary of Oregon is also interested in the case, according to Best.

Both men were optimistic over the situation and were confident they will prove their case in the trial, which is the first accorded them, although they have been haled into federal court several times before this present order. They expressed indignation in regard to the manner in which their case has been handled so far.

Davis and Best were ordered from the land last year because it was not open to settlement, but, despite the federal court order, the men have continued to reside on the disputed land. Last year they were also cited for contempt of court for failure to observe a previous order to move and each served at a jail sentence of 20 days in Portland. On their release they told officers they would move out last spring and because of their failure to do so they are now again ordered to court.
