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SOLVING THE FARM PROBLEM

A GREAT many people are interested in the McNary-Haugen bill as a political football, to be inflated from time to time and kicked about.

Thomas D. Campbell, president of the Campbell Farming Corporation, however, belongs to this minority.

Below we present his conclusions. It will be interesting to compare them with the recommendations Secretary Hoover is expected to make, sometime in the near future.

"Give the farmer the same protection through our tariff as other industries enjoy, and the advantages which labor has through restricted immigration."

For example, "Tons and tons of molasses are imported into this country yearly from Cuba for the manufacture of industrial alcohol. This by-product of raw sugar is purchased very cheaply."

"As a result, this poor corn drifts to terminal markets, and because it can be delivered on future contracts at a reasonable discount it keeps the price down on 2,000,000,000 bushels of corn."

In the second place, Mr. Campbell urges for the improvement of farm conditions and adjustment of transportation rates so that the farmer does not pay a percentage of freight rates in excess of the percentage paid by other manufactured products.

To illustrate: "It costs approximately one-third of the gross selling price of a car of grain to transport it to Chicago. Imagine what would happen to the manufacturer's article if proportional rates prevailed."

As one solution to the transportation problem, Mr. Campbell advocates a development of the Mississippi river. Greater transportation facilities are an absolute necessity as improved machinery has so speeded up harvesting that grain must be taken rapidly from the terminals.

As a final remedy for this farm problem, Mr. Campbell urges a closer co-operation between the farmer and the business man. "The farmer feels that business is unfriendly to him. On the other hand, the average business man feels that the farmer is lazy and has not ordinary business integrity."

In conclusion, this article in "The Magazine of Business" points to the need of farm organization. "Organization among the farmers and the adoption of industrial methods will bring them the success to which they are entitled."

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WEST COAST AIR TRANSPORT WILL EXTEND TO N. Y.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 16.—(AP)—Service of the West Coast Air Transport company, now owned by the Union Air Lines, will be extended to Los Angeles and San Diego within 60 days, it has been announced in San Francisco in connection with filing a request for permit to sell \$15,000,000 worth of stock in California. The announcement was verified at the local office of the company. Union Air Lines was incorporated in Oregon recently.

The next step will be establishment of air passenger service between San Diego and El Paso as the first link of a transcontinental air line reaching to New York. Three new planes have been ordered for the coast service. One is the 21-passenger plane announced some time ago, and the others will be 14-passenger craft. The announcement also told of the company's intention to move its headquarters from Portland to San Francisco. C. V. Eskin is president of the line.

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ATTACKS WOMAN WITH AXE THEN KILLS HIMSELF

SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 16.—(AP)—Frank Montero, 43, Wash station truck gardener, shot and killed himself on the John Tazzoli ranch today after he wounded Tazzoli fatally and mutilated the latter's wife and step-daughter with a hatchet. Tazzoli died shortly afterward.

The attack took place shortly after Tazzoli left his ranch with a truckload of produce for Sacramento markets.

Montero, believed demented, entered the Tazzoli dwelling from the tank house where he slept, and attacked Mrs. Mary Tazzoli, 35, and Mary Lewis, 14, mutilating their faces with a hatchet when they resisted.

Sacramento hospital attendants said they believed the wife and stepdaughter will recover.

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
