C., headquarters of the National Geographic society.

There have been widely divergent theories as to this. It has been variously suggested that the 22 characters were adopted from the hieroglyphics and the hieratic writing of Egypt, the cuneiform characters of Babylon, and symbols of the Hittites, Creteans, and ancient Greeks.
