

THOUSAND ATTEND ADVENTIST MEET AT JACKSONVILLE

Yesterday was a great day on the Adventist camp ground at Jacksonville, where nearly a thousand members of the church assembled under the large canvas pavilion in observance of their Sabbath. They began the day with devotional exercises for both old and young at six o'clock.

At 9:30 a. m. the Rogue River Academy orchestra and camp meeting choir furnished special music, and the congregation joined in a lively song service. At 10:45 the entire encampment assembled for the Sabbath school hour, the kindergarten children, primaries, and juniors meeting in separate divisions in the court house.

At eleven o'clock Rev. Cecil K. Meyers, secretary of the general conference, preached a very soul-stirring sermon on the subject, "Prepare to Meet thy God." At the close of the sermon a call was made for consecration in which the entire congregation joined and, after having given themselves anew to the Lord, they responded to an appeal for a foreign mission offering which totalled nearly one thousand dollars.

Rev. William Guthrie preached at the 2:30 hour on the subject of "Richness by Faith." The large pavilion was not sufficient to accommodate the crowd, and many seats had to be provided reaching way back into the vacant lot.

Special services are held twice daily for all the young people and children, and the one aim of the meeting is to lead all into a closer fellowship with the Lord, making that preparation of heart and development of character which will fit whole families for a place in the Kingdom of Heaven.

At the 7:30 o'clock hour last night, Mr. Meyers, who spent seventeen years in the foreign mission field, gave a stereoscopic lecture on his travels in India showing the progress of the efforts of the missionaries of the denomination. Publishing houses, sanitariums, schools, mission stations, and the people in their native dress and poverty-stricken condition were shown in exceptionally fine slides which brought great courage to the entire congregation as they saw pictured the result of their offerings to the foreign mission project.

Many more delegates arrived in the city and will be camped on the grounds for the coming week to enjoy the blessings of the annual session. Services for the public tomorrow will be at 9:15, 10:45 a. m., and 2:30 and 7:30 p. m.

The Elks band, directed by P. Wilson Waite, will assist with the musical program.

OUTLINE PROGRAM OF STATE EDITORS ON CRATER VISIT

Features of the program of the Oregon State Editorial association, which will hold its annual meeting at Crater Lake June 30 to July 2 as guests of R. W. Sawyer, president of the association.

Probably the most important discussion will be pertaining to field manager activity which was recently undertaken by the association. Harris Ellsworth, field manager, will report on the meeting of the national association of field managers at Memphis which he attended. He will also outline the line in mind.

By way of entertainment it is possible that the "Craters" of Medford will put on a show at the lake. The Medford Golf Club has extended the courtesies of the club to those who assemble at Medford on their way to the convention.

ZONING PLAN AND SEWER ORDINANCE UP NEXT TUESDAY

The City council will have some important matters to consider next Tuesday night, including the passage of an ordinance fixing the assessments for all the new sewers that have been laid in the city within the past year, and probable final consideration of the new zoning plan of the city planning commission, which was some time ago submitted to the council for approval.

The latter commission at its meeting last week approved the petition for the new Parker potato chip factory on south Riverside in the vicinity of 13th and Erhart sts. The commission also approved a petition to build a new service station at 13th and Riverside, next to the paint shop.

The matter of the extension of the business district on the west side to include both sides of Sixth street and West main street to as far as Orange avenue, which has been recommended to the city council by the city planning commission will also come up for consideration by the council at Tuesday night's meeting.

NOVEL MACHINE TESTS PISTONS

Radio is exercising a direct effect in the quality of automobiles. Some time ago the Packard Motor Car company developed a machine, using principles involved in radio transmission, for the inspection of piston pin. Now Packard is using radio equipment for measuring the sound of bearings.

Each roller or ball bearing rolling into a Packard car is run on a soundless spindle and the noise it makes while operating is measured. If it exceeds a fixed standard the bearing is rejected.

The testing is done in a sound proof room especially constructed for the work. In effect the action of a radio receiving set is reversed. A loud speaker takes in the sound and passes it thru the set. The sound is amplified and the volume registered on a dial gauge.

So sensitive is the device that a low voiced "ah" uttered in the farthest corner from the loud speaker sets up a violent flutter of the needle on the gauge.

SALEM, Ore., June 16.—(AP) The Oregon League of the Catholic Central society will hold its annual meeting at the state fairgrounds here this afternoon. This will be followed tomorrow by a gathering of all Catholic organizations in the state under the auspices of the central society. The meeting today is expected to bring 150 delegates to Salem, while the meeting tomorrow, it is said, will bring 3,000 visitors.

COPCO METER BOX THAT BEES USED IS A THRIFT 'AD'

About a year ago, a local "Thrift" exhibit originated by H. C. Bromley, advertising manager of The California Power Company created widespread interest and received favorable publicity in several national publications. The exhibit was based upon the thrift of the local colony of woodpeckers and was used in connection with advertising Copco Preferred Stock.

Now, if you happen to pass the Copco windows on West Main st., you will see another "Thrift" display, also taken from nature. This time the "busy bee" is used as a motif by Mr. Bromley and the effectiveness of the display can readily be judged by the crowds of people gathered about the window.

The central figure of the exhibit is a big meter box taken from one of the Copco poles on the East Side. This box looked good to a local colony of bees who selected it for a bee-hive, sealed up the cracks around the door and proceeded to manufacture honey therein. Due to the fact that the meter was no longer in active use they were not disturbed for some time and when the Copco line crew came to salvage this equipment they met with some active opposition.

It was finally found necessary to call in the services of a local bee expert who gathered in the colony of bees, removed the honey and returned the box to the power company. It may now be seen as a part of a Copco Preferred Stock display in the west window of the company's Home Office Building here.

An appropriately worded poster in the display states as follows: "A Lesson in Thrift from Nature. Even the 'Busy Bee' Invests His Savings in Copco Properties."
