Mrs. Coolidge, although suffering no ill effects from the long journey from Washington, decided to remain at the lodge, enjoying the cool breeze sweeping off Lake Superior.

Mr. Coolidge was up early today. Accompanied by an aide he tramped through some of the trails leading from the cleared space around the lodge into the virgin wilderness surrounding it.
