CITY DADS AND ADVISOR ABSENT, MAY DELAY MEET

Despite the fact that the regular city council meeting scheduled for tonight was expected to have one of the heaviest programs of business for transaction for weeks past, it is doubtful this noon that this meeting would be held, and it is held legally to transact some of the business, because of the absence of several of the councilmen and Mayor Alenderfer and City Attorney John H. Carlin.

Two members of the council finance committee, A. C. Hubbard, who is in the east, and who is also by law the vice-mayor or chairman of the council when the mayor is absent, and R. B. Hammond, who is attending the international convocation of the Kiwanis club in Washington, and Councilman A. J. Crose, who is attending the state National Guard encampment, are away from the city, as is also City Attorney John H. Carlin, who left last night for Salem, to finish up his work as acting governor of the state, and Mayor Alenderfer, who left last night for Portland to be gone until Thursday.

The city council consists of eight members, and with three members away from the city, including the council chairman, there is only left a bare quorum of members, Messrs. E. H. Jamney, Joseph O. Gray, J. W. Jacobs, J. J. Buchter and P. W. Kershaw. One of this quorum would have to act as chairman of the meeting tonight in place of A. C. Hubbard, who is on a vacation trip east, and the question has been raised if it would be legally permissible to have one of the quorum act as chairman and also vote on measures coming up for action.

If it is not legal to so act, then when he assumes the chairmanship in the absence of the mayor and Mr. Hubbard, it is argued by some that it breaks the quorum. Among the important matters scheduled to come up tonight is the passage of an ordinance fixing the assessments for the various districts, for all the sewer improvement work done the past year, and passage of resolutions declaring the council's intention to pave Tripp, Arcadia Spencer, South Park, Portland and Almond streets. Then action, too, was required on important bond and other matters.

KINCAID QUILTS FAIR PAVILION

Lucius Kincaid, who with A. W. Walker had been operating the fairgrounds dance pavilion, announced today that he will discontinue the pavilion dances and will reopen his Eagle Point dance pavilion next Saturday and will continue dances there every Saturday night until the completion of a new pavilion he plans to construct at Gold Hill.

Kincaid and Walker operated the fairgrounds pavilion for several weeks, the dancing going until after midnight, but a county court order last week ordered the hall closed at 12 p. m., as provided by the state law. However, the state law, said Kincaid today, does not affect his Eagle Point hall, which is within the corporate limits of a town.

Kincaid's Imperial orchestra, which played at Eagle Point last winter, will play again when the pavilion reopens.

IMPORTANT MEET OF LEGION HEADS

4000 VISITORS HAVE ALREADY BEEN TO C. LAKE

The road through the national park all the way to Crater Lake lodge is cleared of snow and was opened to automobile travel today, which is a day earlier than was expected some time ago.

Local and tourist travel to the lake, which set in lightly over a week ago, has now set in heavily, and undoubtedly will greatly increase, now that the cars can go all the way to the lodge and the fact that the lodge opens for the season next Friday noon. Up to date, there has been a total of 4000 visitors to the park since spring, including visitors from China, Australia, Germany, Hawaii and many of the eastern states.

The above news was sent out from the Crater national park last night, and word also reached here today that the preparations for the opening of the lodge are well under way and that the contingent of lodge employees, and largest one, will leave for the park next Friday forenoon.

NEW SUPER SERVICE STATION WILL OPEN HERE AUGUST 1ST

Final arrangements are under way for the opening of the Witham & Long super service station in Thimilton Patton's modern style reinforced stucco building nearing completion at the corner of Eighth and Riverside streets. The new location will be in operation August 1, according to plans.

Modern in every detail, the new station will equal any in Oregon, said H. C. Witham this morning, in describing the design, which was secured in Hollywood. Associated products will be handled, including batteries and all electrical equipment. Grease racks and a complete speedometer department are other features planned by the owners.

A shipment of 400 tires will be received here Wednesday and will be on sale at the Witham Battery and Electric store on Riverside pending the opening of the new service station.

LAKE CREEK IS INCENSED OVER PHONE SERVICE

Voicing dissatisfaction with the telephone service of their district, H. H. Fox and T. L. Farlow of Lake Creek were in Medford today seeking a remedy for the telephone situation, which they say has been a source of much grief and inconvenience for a long time. The Lake Creek telephone lines formerly were all routed into Medford, but a recent change now brings the lines into the Eagle Point telephone exchange.

"We find the line routing into Eagle Point far from satisfactory," said Mr. Fox, "and practically every Lake Creek resident is anxious to have the lines changed back to the Medford exchange. We used to be able to call Medford direct and now each time we call there is a toll charge of 15c, making it nearly unadvisable to transact business as readily. We farmers only want fair play and we aim to get it if possible. So far we haven't been getting it, for they cut us onto Eagle Point without consulting the users of the line. That was 16 days ago.

"If our three lines are routed back to Medford, it would mean more business for the city and greater convenience for us. Will my line, the one on which I am a customer, was cut over 16 days ago, the two other lines were cut only a short time before. As a result, we are organizing among ourselves to see that justice is given us."

C. C. LEMMON HAS A WALKAWAY IN SCHOOL ELECTION

At the annual school election held yesterday afternoon at the junior high school building between the hours of 2 p. m. and 7 p. m., to elect a school board member for a three year term to succeed Emil Mohr whose term had expired, C. C. Lemmon, the only candidate whose petition had been filed, was overwhelmingly elected by 174 votes, the rest of the 292 votes cast going to two men whose names were written in on the ticket, E. C. Silliman having 22, and E. H. Hurd 6.

The school board convened last night to administer the oath of office to Mr. Lemmon and install him as a board member. It was one of the quietest elections in the history of the Medford schools, and Mr. Lemmon would have had an unanimous vote had it not been that Mr. Silliman, it is claimed, asked his ardent friends to write in the name of himself or Mr. Hurd, his attorney, on the school ballot, to show his resentment against the school board for having some time ago backed up the city planning commission in ordering closed the Silliman candy, lunch and school supplies store in a house opposite the high school building on Second street.

This case is still pending in court and Mr. Hurd is Mr. Silliman's attorney in the litigation. It is understood that Mr. Hurd did not seek or ask for any votes at yesterday's election.

Carl Swigart was elected president of the school board.
