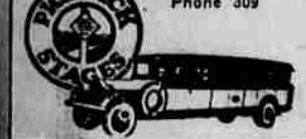

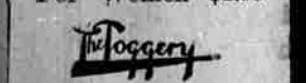
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JACKSONVILLE ENTHUSIASTIC OVER CAMP MEET

ERROR IN WHEELER CO. VOTE CHANGES RESULT

SALEM, Ore., June 19.—(P)—Detection of an error in the canvass of the Wheeler county vote by the Wheeler county clerk, reveals that James D. Burns of Condon has been elected a delegate to the democratic national convention instead of M. M. Hill of Hood River. The error was made known to the secretary of state yesterday and the result is that Burns received a total of 3,177 votes in the second district or 25 more than Hill who received 3,152.

SHIPSTEAD HAS A WALKAWAY

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 19.—(AP)—Nomination of Arthur E. Nelson of St. Paul as republican candidate for United States senator, was conceded today by his nearest opponent as additional returns came in from Monday's primary.

United States Senator Henrik Shipstead, farmer-laborer, was renominated by a wide margin in yesterday's state primary.

The democratic candidate for senator, George H. Cushman of St. Louis, with no opposition, was automatically nominated, as were all candidates on that party ticket.

Senator Shipstead's renomination was the walkaway his supporters had predicted and he ran better than 19 to 1 over William Watkins of Minneapolis.

Governor Theodore Christianson's renomination of the republican ticket was on a basis of more than 2 to 1 over George T. Simpson of Minneapolis.

Urges Indian Missions

DETROIT, June 19.—(AP)—Churches of the Northern Baptist convention were urged today by Dr. Frank A. Smith, secretary of missions of the Baptist Home Missionary society of New York, to provide missions for 10,000 Indians in five areas in northern California, Nevada, Oklahoma and Montana, allocated by other evangelical bodies to the Baptists.

SENATOR HALE IS AN EASY WINNER

PORTLAND, Maine, June 19.—(AP)—The United States Senator Frederick Hale was renominated for a third term in the republican primary yesterday, easily defeating Governor Ralph O. Brewster. Ira G. Hersey, republican, who is serving his sixth term as representative from the fourth district, was defeated for renomination by Donald W. Snow, a Bangor attorney.

In a four-cornered contest in the republican nomination for governor, William Tudor Gardner, wealthy resident of Gardner and former speaker of the Maine house of representatives, received more votes than his opponents combined.

There were no contests for the major democratic nomination. The nominees are: For senator, Herbert E. Holmes, Lewiston, an attorney; for governor, Edward C. Moran, Jr., Rockland merchant.
