MURDERED MAN FEARED DEATH, WARNED FRIENDS

RENO, Nev., June 20.—(AP)—In a long-distance telephone conversation with Herman Dink of Reno last Friday afternoon, John Glab, retired Illinois druggist, who was killed in Los Angeles Monday night, said he would be in Reno by Monday of this week. "Unless I am bumped off before I can get away," Dink told the Reno police today.

"If I am bumped off you will know who did it," Dink said Glab told him over the telephone.

Dink said Glab had told him several times about an "ex-cop," and about the alleged intimacy of the "ex-cop" and Hazel, Glab's wife. Glab also said that there was a "dope ring" angle to his troubles in Los Angeles and advised Dink over the telephone "not to mix up in this affair if I am bumped off, because you will get it too."

Dink said he would go to Los Angeles if necessary and aid in the investigation of Glab's death. Dink and Glab were engaged in mining near Reno in 1926 and Dink said Glab wanted to come back here this week in order to get away from expected trouble.

SUNDAY BLUE LAWS ARE ASSAILED BY ADVENTIST ELDER

A splendid audience greeted Elder Morde Lukens at the Seventh-day Adventist camp meeting at Jacksonville last night, when he spoke on the subject of "Religious Liberty," and pointed out that throughout all ages a combination of church and state were a detriment to both institutions. Mr. Lukens gave an able address on the present agitation for Sunday blue laws through certain organizations which are making it an issue for the District of Columbia, as that it might compromise congress on the question of enacting a Sunday law as a pattern for the states. This resolution was unanimously adopted and voted on by the whole assembly opposing any enactment that would infringe upon the liberties of the American people.

A recommendation was passed to put on a strong campaign to educate the people on this important civil question.

The regular program was carried out at the camp today.

At the evening service Elder C. A. Russell will deliver the message on the "Importance of Christian Education for the Youth."

Big Bill Thompson Is Found Guilty of Huge Money Grab

CHICAGO, June 20.—(AP)—Mayor William Hale Thompson, Michael J. Flaherty, Geo. E. Harding and Percival B. Coffin, public administrator, and three real estate experts were found in circuit court today to have conspired together in hiring the real estate men to do special work under the last Thompson administration at a cost to the city of \$1,722,273.

Judge Hood Friend ordered the defendants to make retribution of that sum to the city treasury.

The court, terminating the two-year-old suit, found the conspiracy had a two-fold purpose—financing the political activities of the Thompson organization, and for the private benefit of the members of the conspiracy.

CRESCENT CITY, Cal., June 20.—(AP)—Eighty-seven miles from here to Grants Pass, Ore., is all that remained today for Flying Cloud, leader in the 428-mile Indian marathon from San Francisco, to traverse. He started from here at 6:15 a. m. today.

Chief Utah was reported 24 miles south of here with Melika a mile behind him. Four-tenths of a mile separate Melika and Klamath, while Sermour Smith was 42 miles

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south. He was closely followed by Red Robin, who in turn was a short distance ahead of Chief Geyser. Mad Bull was resting at Orick at 6:45 a. m. Orick is 132 miles south of Grants Pass.
