

TALENT GROWERS DISCUSS CANNERY PRICES AT MEET

TALENT, June 21.—The orchardists of the Talent irrigation district met Friday evening at the office of the company at Talent to discuss prices on Bartlett pears for cannery purposes.

Most of the orchardists were present, representing nearly the full tonnage of the district. From the information received at that time, it was learned that the canned stock from last year is entirely sold out, making a very good chance for active demand for pears for cannery purposes this year.

From the information obtained it was estimated that the crop in Washington and California might slightly exceed last year's production, though it was thought that the crop in the valley would average about the same as last year. A vote was taken at this meeting to learn at what price growers would be willing to contract their crops, figures ranging from \$22 to \$46 a ton, with an average of about \$34. A committee was appointed to obtain an estimate of crops and prices in other districts and to report at a meeting to be held in the near future.

Mrs. Clay Biles spent Thursday at the home of Mrs. John Short.

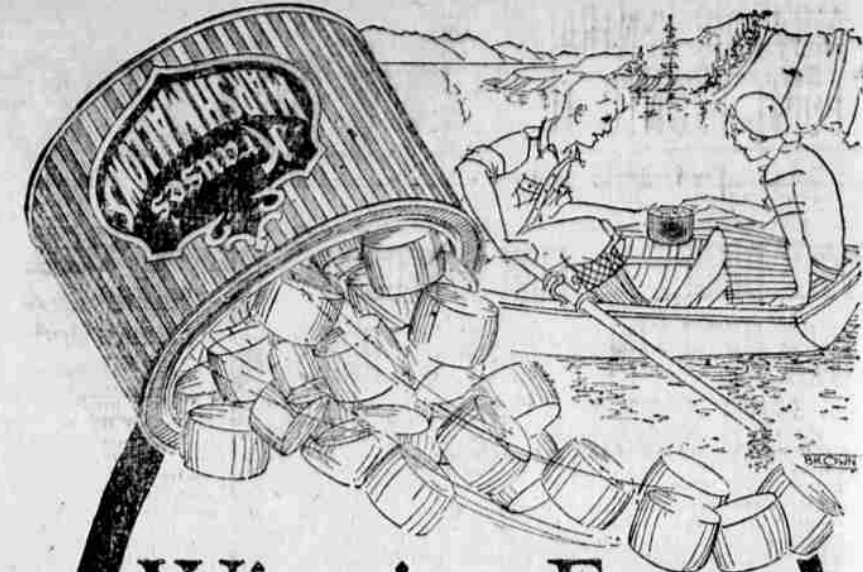
Miss Beth Boomsdief arrived last Saturday from Portland. Mrs. Boomsdief has been delayed in coming by having to undergo an operation.
