Upside-Down Cake

2 tablespoons Crisco 1 cup brown sugar 1 cup shredded or cubed pineapple (or use whole slices from a small can) Melt Crisco in frying pan. Add brown sugar. Stir until melted. Cover with pineapple. (If whole slices, lay them in carefully.) Stir together all dry ingredients. Add eggs. Stir in slowly, boiling water. Add vanilla and bake in moderate oven 350° F. 20 to 30 minutes. Turn from pan upside down so pineapple is on top. Serve with sweetened whipped cream. Top with maraschino cherries. This dessert is delicious made with apples, fresh or canned peaches.
