HEARS S.O.S. FROM THE MISSING

Coal Steamer Picks Up a Radio Distress Call From Amundsen Party—Fail to Locate Missing Party, But Search Efforts Are Feverishly Renewed.

INSCRIPTION ON LOUVAIN BLDG. CAUSES A WAR

LOUVAIN, Belgium, June 23.—(AP)—The title war that has been going on in Louvain over the inscription to be placed over the New Louvain library entered an active phase today when an attempt to place the disputed inscription on the structure was stopped by the police.

The police action was directed by Monsignor P. Ladeuze, rector of the university, who is opposed to the inscription which, translated from the Latin, reads: "Destroyed by German fury, restored by American generosity."
