

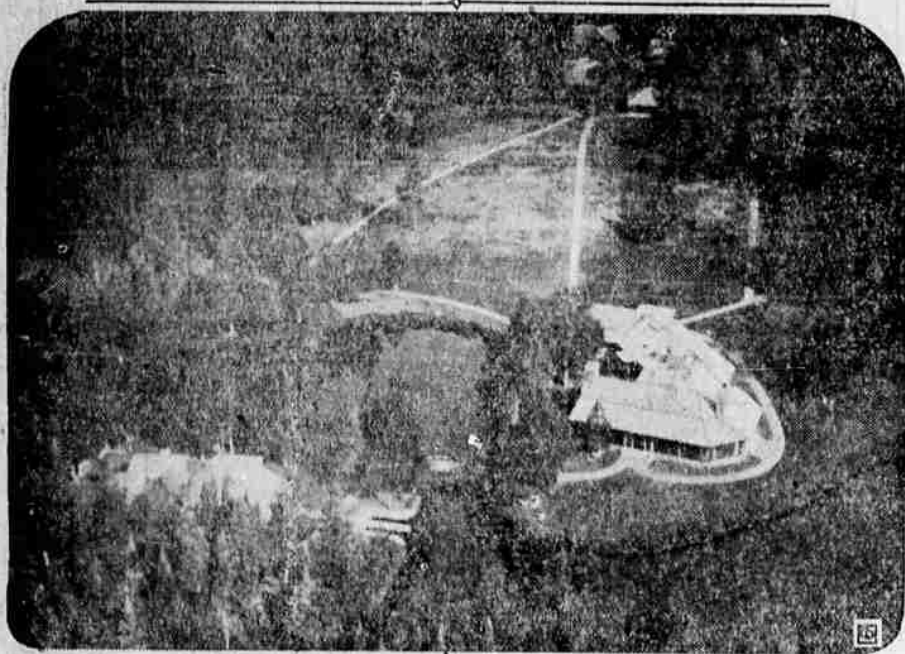

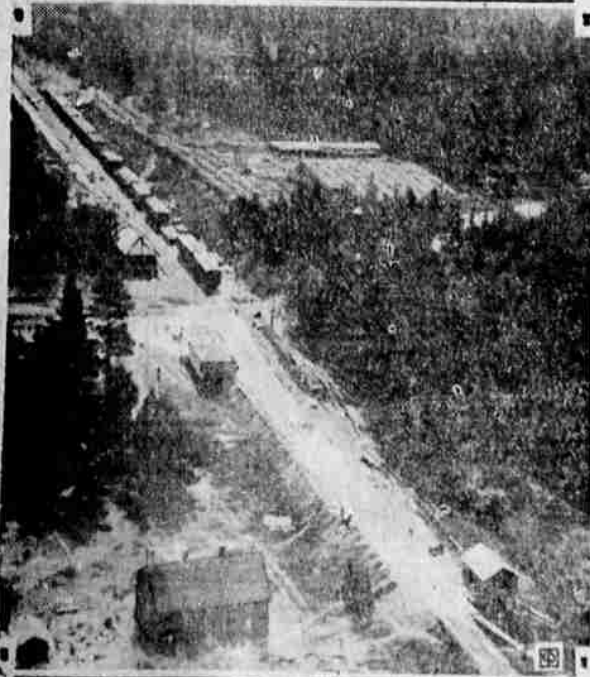

Domain Dwindles



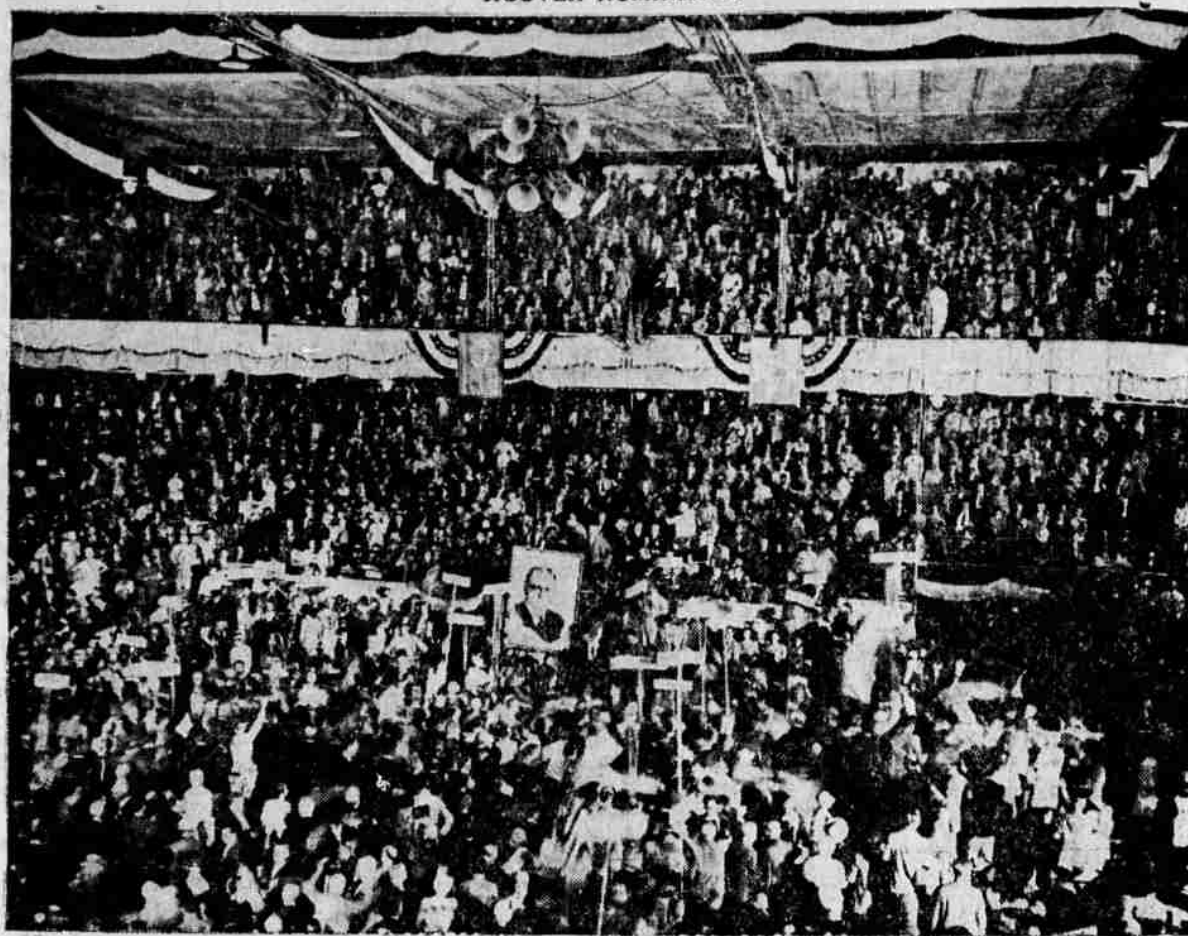

SOUTHERN CROSS MAY UNITE KIN

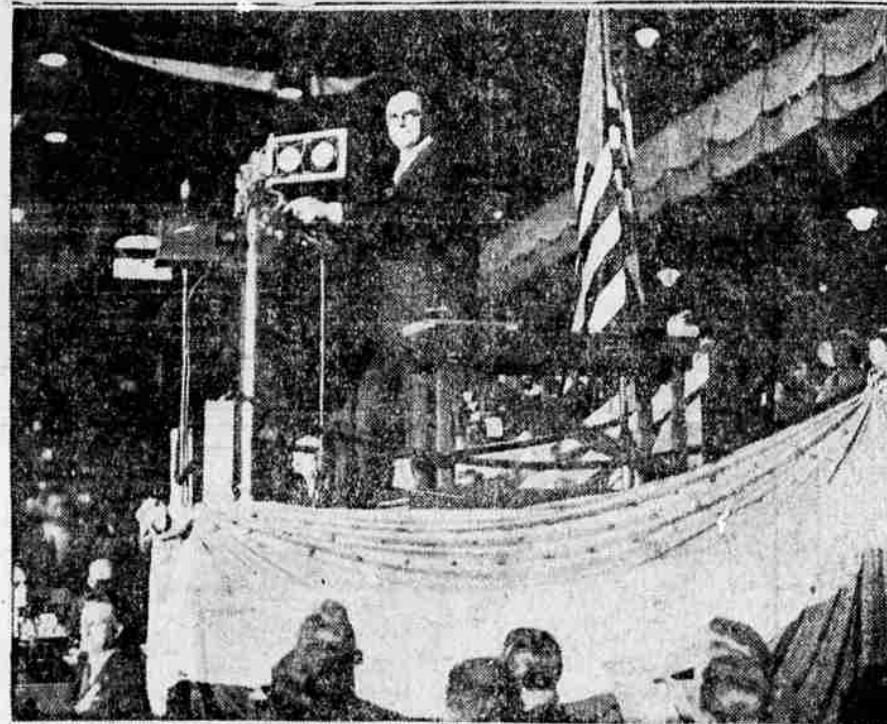

HONEYMOON AT CONVENTION

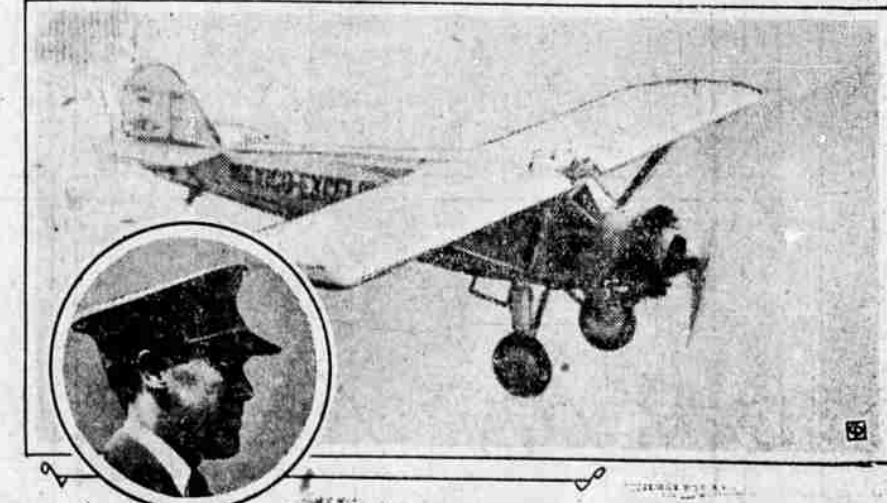

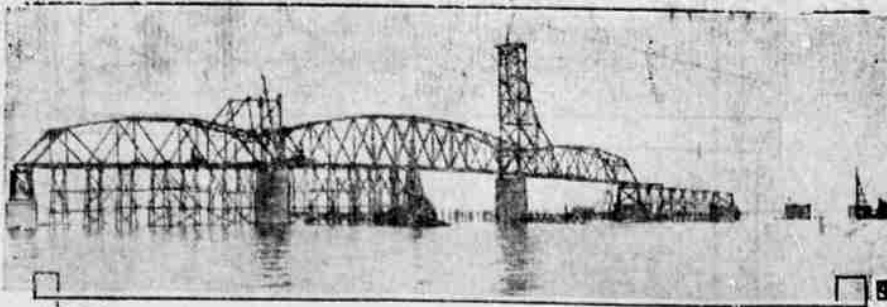


Congressman John L. McNair of California names commerce secretary as Republican presidential standard bearer.
