### PLANE DISASTERS CLAIM 8 LIVES; MARINE AGE LOST

DEL MONTE, Cal., June 23.—(AP)—Two men were killed today when an airplane dropped in a tall spin 2500 feet to crash two miles north of here. The dead are Kenneth G. McIntosh of San Francisco and Clarence Cooke, Jr., of Honolulu. Frank W. Fuller of San Francisco, the pilot, was uninjured.

The victims were well known in California and the Hawaiian islands. McIntosh was the son of C. K. McIntosh, president of the Bank of California at San Francisco. He is survived by a widow and two children, aged 7 and 4.

Cooke, 23, was the son of Clarence Cooke, Sr., head of Lewers and Cooke, said to be the largest bank on the Hawaiian islands. Cooke's father left San Francisco for Honolulu Wednesday. He was notified by wireless of his son's death.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., June 23.—(AP)—Captain Earl H. Zimmerman, airplane instructor, and W. Cowan, a student pilot, were killed instantly when their airplane crashed one-half mile east of the municipal airport tonight.

A boy who witnessed the accident reported that the wings "looked like they collapsed," when the plane was 1,500 feet in the air.
