

CARDS CONTINUE WINNING PACE, DEFEATING REDS

A second division berth seems for the Cincinnati Reds as Jack Hendricks can put his faltering crew together within the next few days.
The Reds lost ground they ill could afford yesterday when the Cardinal steam-roller crunched its way to a 5-to-2 triumph in 11 innings.
Incidentally, it was the Cards' 21st victory in the last 27 games.
When the Chicago Cubs and Pittsburgh Pirates were idle, the New York Giants moved into undisputed possession of second place with a double win over the Phils, 12 to 4 and 8 to 2.
The Dodgers hit Ben Cantwell hard and chalked up their fourth straight victory at the expense of the Boston Braves, 9 to 3.
The Washington Senators knocked off the Philadelphia Athletics twice at the capital, 3 to 2 and 7 to 2.
The Tigers again moved into the cellar while Chicago was moving out when the Sox battered Detroit out an 8-to-2 victory at Detroit. Morgan's home run, one of five hits during the game, gave the Cleveland Indians a 7-to-4 win over the Browns at St. Louis.

LLOYD HAHN TO QUIT RUNNING AFTER OLYMPICS

BOSTON, June 25.—(AP)—Lloyd Hahn, one America's brightest track stars, said today that he would quit running after the Olympic games.
"It will not be one of those stage farewells," he explained, "for I have made up my mind this time to settle down to business. You know a fellow has to give a great deal to track in time and in energy. If you want to be a champion you have to sacrifice much. You cannot think of anything else and what is more you cannot do anything else. It is like any other game, if you want to succeed at it, you cannot do it on part time."
Hahn will probably devote his time to the large farm which his parents own, but do no work, outside of Falls City, Neb.
The Nebraska flier, who has been training here under the direction of Jack Ryder, member of the Olympic coaching staff, is in excellent shape and is confident that he will break the world's half-mile record during the final Olympic tryouts at the Harvard stadium on July 6 and 7. Ryder believes that his star will shade 1:50 if conditions are good.

TERRIBLE TURK DUE TO ARRIVE IN CITY TONIGHT

Hassan Mohammed, the much talked of "Terrible Turk," will arrive in Medford this evening and Medford sporting fans are anxious to get a peep at the giant grappler who has made wrestling history on two continents. After hanging up the heavyweight belt in his own home country, Hassan has discarded the fez for the 1928 model American chapeau and is seeking new honors in this country. Now it looks like he's going to hit a pretty tough match here in Medford as the American Legion Drum Corps and Sailor Jack Woods have arranged a fray between the Turk and Jack Roller at the Armory Friday night.
Jack, who tips the beam at 225 pounds with a five pound edge on the Terrible Turk, is a real exponent of the gentle art of bone-bruising and the formidable mat achievements of his opponent do not seem to daunt the big German in the least. Tonight he is tackling Bill Sandahl at Butte Falls.
Friday's smother promises to be one of the best in several months as both the husky German wrestler and Hassan, the Turk, are top-notch grapplers and unusually colorful in the ring. It is rumored that there is considerable feeling between the two men, so Friday's tussle should be a rough one. Some good preliminaries will complete the card.

U.S. WATER POLO TEAM ALL STAR AGGREGATION

CHICAGO, June 25.—(AP)—America's water polo team again will be an all-star aggregation.
Because of the dispute over the national championship between the Chicago Athletic association and the Illinois Athletic club at the indoor meet here last April, the United States Olympic committee changed its plan of sending one team to represent the United States at Amsterdam.
The team will be composed of 11 players from four clubs and Stanford university. The players are: Johnny Weissmuller, Wallen and Laver of the I. A. C.; Topp, Greenberg, Daniels and Broeyer of the C. A.; Mitchell and Schroth of the Olympic club, San Francisco, and Harrison of Stanford and Vollmer of the New York Athletic club.

BILL TILDEN HAS YET TO LOSE A LONDON MATCH

WIMBLEDON, England, June 26.—(AP)—William T. Tilden and George Lott of the United States Davis cup tennis team, who have yet to lose a set in the English championship tournament, scored easily today in the second round of play.
After Tilden had defeated H. C. Fisher, young Oxford university student from Burma, by scores of 6-1, 6-2, 6-1. Lott downed H. K. Lister, captain of the Cambridge university team last year, by 6-1, 7-5, 7-5.
Another favorite to win today was Idrac H. L. Demopurgo, Italian ace, who downed D. H. Williams, 6-2, 6-4, 6-2.
Main interrupted play shortly after it started, but the shower soon ceased.
The shower was only a passing one, and Tilden, taking the court again against Fisher, won in short order by scores of 6-1, 6-3, 6-1. The defending champion, Henri Cochet of France, taking matters rather easy at first, was extended in the final set to defeat the Australian, Hopman, 6-1, 6-4, 8-6.
