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GOVERNOR SMITH DANCES WITH GLEE TO SECOND VICE AS RADIO SINGS PRES. CANDIDATE

ALBANY, N. Y., June 28.—(AP)—Governor Smith was up until well into the early hours listening over the radio to the deconstruction staged at the democratic convention when his name was placed in nomination for the presidency, and he made no attempt to conceal his gratification.

He turned in as soon as the evening session began and did not miss a word or a shout or a blast of music. As the demonstration broke out at the close of Franklin D. Roosevelt's speech, offering him as the party's standard bearer in the presidential race, the governor grinned. Raising one hand, he twisted it above his head as though he too were on the convention floor and swinging a clacker in celebration.

When the radio reproduced the music of a band playing "The Sidewalks of New York," he could no longer contain himself and rising he danced slowly several times about a circle of family and friends who had been listening to the convention deluged with him.

They applauded his dancing and he acknowledged their hand-clapping with a bow, his flushed face breaking into a grin of evident pleasure at the way affairs were progressing.

After his name had been placed in nomination, the governor was asked for a statement, but stood by his determination not to say anything of political import until after the balloting.

The delegates commented, too, on the strong address made by the women delegates in seconding nominations.

LOCATE CAMP OF 2 U. S. HOSTAGES

GUADALAJARA, Jalisco, Mexico, June 28.—(AP)—Colonel Robadilla, chief of staff of the military commandant, announced today that the insurgents who kidnaped the American mining men, W. M. Mitchell and John F. Hooper, had been located at El Salvador, near Toquilla.

Troops were concentrated in the district and today were throwing a cordon around it. It was hoped that they would be able to rescue the prisoners without paying the \$1500 ransom demanded.

CLAIMS AUSTRIA AND ITALY PLAN WAR ON RUSSIA

VIENNA, June 28.—(AP)—Franz Dinghofer, minister of justice has resigned his post as an outgrowth of criticism regarding his refusal to permit the extradition of Bela Kun, communist leader to Hungary.

It is believed the entire cabinet will fall.

The fiery communist who is being held in Austria on a charge of entering the country after having been expelled, caused a sensation in court today when he declared that the reason he had come to Austria was because the third international had cumulative proof that Italy and Hungary were preparing for war against soviet Russia.

Other countries would be dragged into this war, said the erstwhile communist leader and the "proletariat" would be made fodder for their cannon.

Bela Kun was defiant and almost insolent in his attitude toward his three judges.

GOVERNOR SMITH SEES LITTLE GIRL AS HIS SUCCESSOR

ALBANY, N. Y., June 28.—(AP)—Governor Smith visualizes the day when his own present position as chief executive of the Empire state will be held by a woman.

"The chief difference I notice between exercises like this now and 35 years ago," he said in an address at the graduation of his youngest son from the Academy of the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, "is that both boys and girls take part now together."

"In my youth there were exercises for the boys of the class one day and girls the next. The reason for that was that the things you'd tell the boys in that day you would not tell the girls. You'd advise the boys so that they might train themselves to be captains of industry, professional men or statesmen. You never would have thought of telling that to the girls. Not then, but now you tell them both the same things, because they are doing the same things."

He turned with a smile to a plump classmate of his son who had won several prizes for scholarship, Mary McManus.

"It is not outside the realm of possibility," he said, "that one of these days we'll be hearing 'Mary McManus for governor.'"

SAYS AMUNDSEN WILL BE FOUND

OSLO, Norway, June 28.—(AP)—Having completed a search of Barents sea to the east of Bear Island without finding any trace of Roald Amundsen and the five others missing with him in a French seaplane, the Norwegian government steamer Michael Sars, today turned toward the west of the island.

The plane was believed to be in the vicinity of Bear Island when the last radio signals were heard from it.

The captain of the sealing ship Hobby, which arrived at Tromsø from Spitzbergen where it had participated in the rescue work, said he felt no alarm for the safety of Amundsen and his companions. He thought that if the plane had passed Bear Island it had probably landed on the ice.

Advices from Tromsø, however, revealed that Captain Rene Gullhaug, the pilot, had declared before setting out that it would be difficult for the airmen to save themselves if they were forced down in a rough sea.

VESUVIUS IS IN ERUPTION AGAIN

RESINA, Italy, June 28.—(AP)—Vesuvius was in eruption today. Since no fear or disaster was felt, tourists were flocking to this town at the foot of the mountain.

Small crystallized fragments fell on the road leading to the volcano, but visitors kept on toward the summit, apparently unafraid.

For three days there have been explosions. Fragments of molten lava have been hurled high to fall back on the eruptive cone. The cone was raised almost to the level of the great crater which crumbled on April 8, 1906.

It was thought that the cone would be engulfed in the crater itself since the greater part of the lava has risen to the level of the eruptive mouth.

U. S. ATLANTIC FLIERS FORCED DOWN, FRANCE

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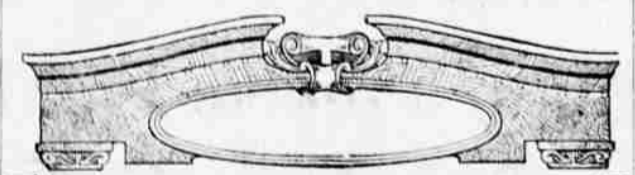
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
