

# ORE. DELEGATES DISAPPOINTED IN PLATFORM

### Wanted Democrats to Back Up Smith for Modification of Dry Law—Will Indorse Os West for National Committeeman.

HOUSTON, Texas, June 29.—(AP)—As the democratic national convention entered into what was expected to be the final day's sessions, indications were seen that Oswald West would be reported as Oregon's selection for national committeeman.

The Oregon delegation, regardless of its opinion on West's desirability as Oregon's member of the national committee, apparently in most cases had reached the conclusion that they had no alternative under the state primary law but to submit his name to the convention.

West's stand against the candidacy of Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York resulted in the question of the Oregon man's desirability. Some delegates today expressed the opinion that the matter would not be considered further by the delegates.

Attempts prior to today to obtain full attendance of the delegation at a conference over the committee membership proved futile. Dan J. Fry of Salem, chairman of the delegation, announced yesterday that a meeting would probably be held today to decide the matter.

West's name was not reported when the roll of states was called in convention for the purpose of reporting state committeemen and it was later explained that his pre-convention attitude toward Smith's candidacy had rendered questionable the advisability of verifying him for the place. West was quoted by several of the delegation as saying he would resign from the committee place in event of Smith's nomination.

The Oregon delegates faced the final business of the convention in special frame of mind after last night's hasty session. They declared themselves pleased with the platform although some of them would have preferred a declaration of modification or re-submission of the prohibition amendment to the people. They agreed, however, that the prohibition plank as adopted was probably the best that could be obtained under the circumstances and expressed pleasure that a contest over the question on the convention floor had been avoided.

The Oregonians were thinking today of making a quick departure for home upon the termination of the convention. They were looking forward to the cooler weather of the Pacific northwest with pleasant anticipation.

Most of the delegates will return home by train, although some will make the trip by automobile. Ashby C. Dickson drove here from Oregon. Bert E. Haney, drove as far as Los Angeles, completing the journey by train. He will return up the coast by motor from the California city.

# HEAVY DAMAGE IN DIXIE STATES BY WIND STORM

NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 29.—(AP)—Heavy rains and a wind that reached tornado proportions caused extensive damage throughout Tennessee and Kentucky last night and today. Alexandria, Tenn., where 23 homes and 44 barns were reported destroyed or badly damaged and which was cut off by flooded and blocked roads, suffered heavy loss. In Lexington it was estimated that \$500,000 damage was done in crippled wires, flooded roads and basements.

Lexington's streets were several feet under water, and its two principal hotels, the Phoenix and LaFayette, suffered damage estimated at \$20,000. Flooded basements at the University of Kentucky caused \$20,000 damage.

The only loss of life reported was in Nashville, where John S. Lewis, a deputy sheriff, was killed when he stepped into a puddle of water on his front porch into which a high power wire had blown.

# PROHIBITION FOR DAKOTA WINS

FARGO, N. D., June 29.—(AP)—A fluctuating lead for the dry forces in their fight against the repeal of the prohibition clause in the state's constitution went over 6000 votes late today when 1400 precincts of the state's 2192 had reported from Wednesday's primary. After dropping down to 1000, the lead sprang upward again when new precincts in the eastern part of the state reported. The figures were: For repeal 67,728 and 73,769 against.

HELENA, Mont., June 29.—(AP)—Characterizing the democratic presidential nominee as "the most striking character that has appeared on the political stage since Roosevelt," United States Senator T. J. Walsh today expressed satisfaction with the action of the national convention, both as to its choice of party leaders and its platform pledges.

# DEMOCRATS QUIT HOUSTON CONFAB AS END COMES

SAM HOUSTON HALL, HOUSTON, June 29.—(AP)—The democratic national convention adjourned sine die at 1:47 p. m. today after a session lasting four days.

HOUSTON, Texas, June 29.—(AP)—The new democratic national committee met immediately after the close of the convention today and decided to formally organize at a meeting in the democratic club, New York City on July 11.

There was a suggestion that the committee convene earlier but at the request of Governor Smith, the date was passed to the eleventh. Except for a brief talk by George Gordon Battle of New York, the committee heard no other business. All contests and other business will be taken up at the formal meeting at which a new chairman and other officers will be selected.

One of the contests prepared for filing with the national committee today was that from Oregon whose convention delegation is seeking to oust National Committeeman Oswald West. A statement prepared by Daniel J. Fry, chairman of the delegation, challenged West's loyalty to Governor Smith. The contest went over, however, until the New York meeting.

SAM HOUSTON HALL, HOUSTON, June 29.—(AP)—Governor Smith's telegram replying to the notification of his nomination was read to the democratic national convention today as the last act before final adjournment.

More than half the delegates already had left the hall and those who remained hot and tired from the long session, were for the most part silent during the reading of the message by Senator Harrison of Mississippi, the acting chairman.

There was a very short burst of cheering when the chairman came to the words in which the governor declared he would be bound by the party platform and it elected would follow his oath to the best of his ability.

Cheering followed the reading of that part of the message in which the party nominee reiterated his belief that the prohibition law should be modified.

When the message had been finished the assemblage stood for a moment cheering.

# GOOD TO HANDLE G. O. P. IN WEST

WASHINGTON, June 29.—(AP)—Chairman Work of the republican national committee, announced late today that James W. Good of Chicago, pre-convention campaign manager for Secretary Hoover, had been selected as manager of the western division of the party's campaign.

The appointment of Mr. Good, who is a former representative from Iowa, was made after he had agreed to rearrange his business affairs to as to devote practically his entire time to the campaign work.

He will be in charge of the republican presidential campaign in the western half of the United States.

# PEACH GROWERS TO AIR DIFFERENCES CANNERY PRICES

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—Peach growers and canners of California will take their differences before Governor C. C. Young's conference committee tomorrow.

This announcement was made today by Preston McKinney, vice president of the Canners' League of California, whose operating committee has been in daily conference with representatives of the California Canning Peach Growers' association.

"We have threshed out our problems individually," said McKinney, "but a collective agreement must be reached."

The situation with the growers demanding a \$25 per ton flat price in the face of an estimated pack of nearly 400,000 tons, far in excess of last year, was reported grave.

# STUDEBAKERS IN MOTOR MERGER

BUFAALO, N. Y., June 29.—(AP)—Directors of the Pierce Arrow Motor Car company today approved a merger with the Studebaker corporation.

Announcement of the action was made after a meeting of the directors said that a new holding company would be formed to take over plants, properties and assets of the two companies valued at \$160,000,000. Studebaker, it was announced, will acquire a substantial interest in the new company.

NEW YORK, June 29.—(AP)—Supreme Court Justice Mulvan today denied the application of Calvin H. Goddard, minority stockholders in the Dodge Brothers corporation, for an injunction to restrain the proposed merger of the Chrysler Motor corporation with the Dodge corporation.

Justice Mulvan, however, ordered the Dodge corporation to file a bond to guarantee that all preferred stockholders who have not assented to the merger be paid the current "cash" may be awarded to them as such stockholders by reason of such transfer of assets.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 29.—(AP)—Investigation of export freight rates on wheat shipped from Montana to north Pacific ports will be continued by the interstate commerce commission into next week.

The railroads are giving testimony opposing the present export rates and Puget Sound interests and the Montana grain growers will call a number of witnesses to testify next week in support of the plea for continuance of the rates. The commission was previously hoped to end the hearing this week.
